ASN /ALL GIVES SYNTAX ERROR (SPR 11-M90341 JF)

PROBLEM STATEMENT:

The Monitor Console Routine (MCR) command ASN /ALL gives a syntax error.

#### **RESPONSE:**

The description of the /ALL keyword in the RSX-11M MCR Operations Manual is incorrect. The /ALL keyword is only available on RSX-11M-PLUS systems. On RSX-11M systems, please use the /GBL keyword that performs the same function.

PROBLEM STATEMENT:

The following problems exist in the terminal driver:

- 1. When a control character (such as ^S, ^Q, ^R, etc.) has been declared out-of-band include, its special function should be disabled.
- 2. A comment in the module TTATT is incorrect.
- 3. A nonprivileged terminal should be allowed to issue a break-through write to its own TI:.
- 4. The pass-through and no-echo characteristics should be initialized to false when a remote line is answered.
- 5. There is a redundant instruction in TTRW.
- 6. When a task issues a read from an RT:, and the user enters no input characters and terminates the read with a carriage return or CTRL/Z, the terminator will be passed as input to the task.

QUE /MOD FAILS TO CHANGE /DELETE ATTRIBUTE (SPR 11-M90099 LP)

PROBLEM STATEMENT:

Once you have queued a file with the /DELETE file attribute, you cannot change it to /NODELETE with the QUE/MOD/EN:n/FI:n/NODELETE command, as documented in the Batch and Queue Operations Manual.

#### **RESPONSE:**

The /[NO]DELETE switch was being created with the CSI\$SW macro using incorrect parameter values. This prevented QMGCLI from processing the QUE/MOD command file qualifier /NODELETE properly.

This problem is corrected in RSX-11M Version 4.2 Update D.

FEAT\$C DIRECTIVE DOES NOT WORK IN I- AND D-SPACE TASKS (SPR 11-P00296X JB)

PROBLEM STATEMENT:

The FEAT\$C directive puts the directive parameter block (DPB) into instruction space rather than data space. This prevents the use of that directive in an I- and D-space task.

**RESPONSE:** 

This problem is corrected in RSX-11M-PLUS Version 3.0 Update D.

TASKS RUN WITH /UIC SWITCH GET WRONG UIC (SPR 11-P00200P JB)

PROBLEM STATEMENT:

When running multiple tasks from the clock queue from a single terminal using the /UIC switch, the user identification code (UIC) of the task is not always correct.

#### RESPONSE:

This problem occurs when a second RUN installed task command is issued from the same terminal with a different UIC specified, prior to the first task starting to execute.

QUE /MOD FAILS TO CHANGE /DELETE ATTRIBUTE (SPR 11-P90099 LP)

PROBLEM STATEMENT:

Once you have queued a file with the /DELETE file attribute, you cannot change it to /NODELETE with the QUE/MOD/EN:n/FI:n/NODELETE command, as documented in the Batch and Queue Operations Manual.

### **RESPONSE:**

The /[NO]DELETE switch was being created with the CSI\$SW macro using incorrect parameter values. This prevented QMGCLI from processing the QUE/MOD command file qualifier /NODELETE properly.

This problem is corrected in RSX-11M-PLUS Version 3.0 Update D.

ACNT HANGS WHEN DELETING [GGGMMM] TYPE DIR (SPR 11-P00297X RK)

PROBLEM STATEMENT:

When deleting an account using ACNT and responding Yes to the "Delete UFD and files?" question, if there does not exist a default-directory string entry, ACNT will appear to hang. This problem occurs only when running an RSX-11M-PLUS V3.0 or later ACNT task and using the account files created before RSX-11M-PLUS V3.0 or with the account files created on RSX-11M.

#### **RESPONSE:**

ACNT uses the default directory string to construct a command line which it then sends to PIP to delete the directory. Since the concept of named directories did not exist prior to RSX-11M-PLUS V3.0, there is no entry for this field for account files created before RSX-11M-PLUS V3.0 and account files created on RSX-11M. ACNT does not check to see whether there is a default directory string entry or not. If there is no entry for the default directory string, an erroneous command line is constructed and sent to PIP. When PIP receives this command line, PIP hangs. We are currently investigating this problem with PIP. Since ACNT waits for PIP to complete, ACNT will appear to hang.

ACNT has been modified so that if a default directory entry for that account does not exist, it will use the GROUP and MEMBER entries to construct the PIP command line to delete the directory.

As a workaround to this problem, the files in the directory and the directory file itself can be deleted manually. Another workaround is to enter the MODIFY mode of ACNT and enter the same [gggmmm] as the new default directory. This will initialize the default directory string field. At this point, the directory and directory files may be deleted by ACNT.

This problem is corrected in RSX-11M-PLUS Version 3.0 Update D.

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RSX-11M-PLUS V3.0 MULTI-USER TASK HELLO Seq. No. 4.2.4.4 M

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HELLO ERROR MESSAGE INCORRECT WHEN LOGGED IN (SPR 11-P03113 RDH)

PROBLEM STATEMENT:

Typing HELLO or HELLO LAST\_NAME from a terminal that is already logged in results in the "Unknown HELP qualifier" message rather than the "Other user logged on" message from HELLO.

### **RESPONSE:**

The HELP/HELLO task root was previously changed so that the user command HEL would be interpreted as HELLO if the user were not logged in and as HELP if he were, thereby eliminating the need to input the distinguishing fourth character from the terminal. The implementation of this change erroneously results in all variations of HEL, HELP, or HELL(0) calling HELP if the terminal is logged in.

RSX-11M-PLUS Version 3.0 Update D will include a correction for this problem. The HELL(0) commands will call HELLO independent of whether the terminal is logged in.

BASIC-PLUS-2 V2.3 RSX UPDATE B NOTICE

The BASIC-PLUS-2 V2.3 update files received with Update B of RSX-11M V4.2 and RSX-11M-PLUS V3.0 introduce a problem which under certain circumstances corrupts data values used by a program or written to a file. The situation is as follows:

Arrays declared within MAP or COMMON statements are not mapped properly. As a result, subsequent implicit or explicit assignments to elements of this array may overwrite the contents of other variables declared within the MAP or COMMON.

For example:

- 10 MAP (TSTDAT) STRING FOO = 4%, & STRING ARRAY 1(7%) = 10%
- 20 FOO = 'ABCD'

  PRINT 'FOO before making array assignment ='; FOO

  ARRAY 1(0%) = 'ZZZZZZZZZZZ'

  PRINT 'FOO after making array assignment ='; FOO

  END

This program, when compiled and taskbuilt, will produce the following incorrect output:

FOO before making array assignment = ABCD FOO after making array assignment = ZZZZ

This same program will work correctly when executed from the BASIC-PLUS-2 environment (i.e., OLDed and RUN) or if you do a COMPILE/MAC and then assemble the resultant file.

## NOTE

This problem exists only if you have applied the BASIC-PLUS-2 V2.3 corrections distributed with Update B of RSX-11M V4.2 and RSX-11M-PLUS V3.0. The problem will be corrected in Update C.

To avoid this problem, the following alternatives exist:

- l. Before applying the update, edit the BASIC-PLUS-2 update command
  file, BP2PCH.CMD, and remove the following line:
   WRITE LBR ~37 RSXLIB.OLB/RP = ~37 objgsd
- 2. Do not apply the BASIC-PLUS-2 Update B files
- 3. COMPILE/MAC and assemble the resultant file
- 4. RUN from the BASIC-PLUS-2 environment

PROBLEM STATEMENT:

The following problems exist in the terminal driver:

- When a control character (such as ^S, ^Q, ^R, etc.) has been declared out-of-band include, its special function should be disabled.
- 2. A comment in the module TTATT is incorrect.
- 3. A nonprivileged terminal should be allowed to issue a break-through write to its own TI:.
- 4. The pass-through and no-echo characteristics should be initialized to false when a remote line is answered.
- 5. There is a redundant instruction in TTRW.
- 6. When a task issues a read from an RT:, and the user enters no input characters and terminates the read with a carriage return or CTRL/Z, the terminator will be passed as input to the task.

PROBLEM STATEMENT:

Once you have queued a file with the /DELETE file attribute, you cannot change it to /NODELETE with the QUE/MOD/EN:n/FI:n/NODELETE command, as documented in the Batch and Queue Operations Manual.

### **RESPONSE:**

The /[NO]DELETE switch was being created with the CSI\$SW macro using incorrect parameter values. This prevented QMGCLI from processing the QUE/MOD command file qualifier /NODELETE properly.

ACNT HANGS WHEN DELETING [GGGMMM] TYPE DIR (SPR 11-X00297X RK)

PROBLEM STATEMENT:

When deleting an account using ACNT and responding Yes to the "Delete UFD and files?" question, if there does not exist a default-directory string entry, ACNT will appear to hang. This problem occurs only when running an RSX-11M-PLUS V3.0 or later ACNT task and using the account files created before RSX-11M-PLUS V3.0 or with the account files created on RSX-11M.

### RESPONSE:

ACNT uses the default directory string to construct a command line which it then sends to PIP to delete the directory. Since the concept of named directories did not exist prior to RSX-11M-PLUS V3.0, there is no entry for this field for account files created before RSX-11M-PLUS V3.0 and account files created on RSX-11M. ACNT does not check to see whether there is a default directory string entry or not. If there is no entry for the default directory string, an erroneous command line is constructed and sent to PIP. When PIP receives this command line, PIP hangs. We are currently investigating this problem with PIP. Since ACNT waits for PIP to complete, ACNT will appear to hang.

ACNT has been modified so that if a default directory entry for that account does not exist, it will use the GROUP and MEMBER entries to construct the PIP command line to delete the directory.

As a workaround to this problem, the files in the directory and the directory file itself can be deleted manually. Another workaround is to enter the MODIFY mode of ACNT and enter the same [gggmmm] as the new default directory. This will initialize the default directory string field. At this point, the directory and directory files may be deleted by ACNT.

HELLO ERROR MESSAGE INCORRECT WHEN LOGGED IN (SPR 11-X03113 RDH)

PROBLEM STATEMENT:

Typing HELLO or HELLO LAST\_NAME from a terminal that is already logged in results in the "Unknown HELP qualifier" message rather than the "Other user logged on" message from HELLO.

### **RESPONSE:**

The HELP/HELLO task root was previously changed so that the user command HEL would be interpreted as HELLO if the user were not logged in and as HELP if he were, thereby eliminating the need to input the distinguishing fourth character from the terminal. The implementation of this change erroneously results in all variations of HEL, HELP, or HELL(0) calling HELP if the terminal is logged in.

A future release of Micro/RSX will include a correction for this problem. The HELL(0) commands will call HELLO independent of whether the terminal is logged in.

#### DESCRIPTION

The Ethernet Terminal Server is a network terminal switch for Ethernet Local Area Networks. The Ethernet Terminal Server provides a convenient method to logically connect up to 32 DIGITAL RS-232 asynchronous terminals to one or more service nodes (hosts) on an Ethernet. Once the terminal is connected to the service node, a user can utilize application programs and utilities as though the terminal was directly connected to a host via a DZ11, DMF32, or DHU11 device, with a few restrictions. Thus, the may be possible to utilize the Ethernet Terminal Server to connect all terminals to service nodes in place of traditional interfaces, except for host console terminals. Remote connection via dial-in modems is fully supported.

The Ethernet Terminal Server also provides the capability to connect host systems that do not support the LAT protocol, DIGITAL personal computers, and dial-out modems directly to ports on the server. Interactive server users can issue commands to connect to services which are offered on such ports. Port-to-port connections on the same server are also supported.

The Ethernet Terminal Server implements the Local Area Transport (LAT) protocol for communication with service nodes that implement this protocol on the same Ethernet. This interface has been optimized for high terminal I/O performance over an Ethernet, while reducing host CPU cycles required to handle interrupts. Hence, under most I/O loading conditions, a significant performance gain may be realized by using the Ethernet Terminal Server, versus direct terminal connections via DZ11s.

Software that runs on the Ethernet Terminal Server is downline loaded over the network from a Phase IV DECnet load host. Terminal access to a service node from the Ethernet Terminal Server requires DECnet (for RSX-11M-PLUS and Micro/RSX systems) to be running in the same service node; LAT uses the Ethernet addressing mechanism to transport terminal messages. Refer to the Prerequisite Software section for more information.

Features such as login load balancing, multiple terminal sessions, and automatic failover can lead to greater user productivity.

#### **Features**

#### **Terminal Connection Management**

Through the use of a simple command, users can establish a logical connection, called a session, to any service node that implements the LAT protocol on the same Ethernet LAN. This connection makes the terminal appear as if it were physically connected to the service node, and the terminal user can use standard system utilities and applications supported by that node. Each terminal connected to the server can connect to the same or a different service node on the Ethernet. Furthermore, several servers can be used to connect many terminals to one or more service nodes.

A service node can have one or more services that are offered to Ethernet Terminal Server users. Services and nodes are identified by name. Users usually connect to services, not to nodes, although often one of the service names will be the node name. Users can optionally specify a node and/or a port name when they connect to a service.

#### Non-LAT Host Support

The Ethernet Terminal Server can be used to provide logical terminal connections to hosts that do not implement the LAT protocol. In this type of configuration, the server becomes the Ethernet connection and protocol support for these hosts. This expands the LAT network accessibility to the terminal user to include LAT hosts directly connected to the same Ethernet and hosts connected to the LAT network via the Ethernet Terminal Server.

A host that supports XON/XOFF, ASCII standards and RS-232-C interfaces can be connected to the Ethernet Terminal Server. This provides the terminal user with a transparent connection to the non-LAT host. It is strongly recommended that server port and the host side port utilize modern control signals to automatically signal the host upon session disconnection. In this application the server port appears to the host as a dial-in-modern. However, hosts that require more than one transition of the RING signal are not supported.

In this configuration, there is a one-to-one correspondence between the port on a Ethernet Terminal Server



June 1986 AE-HT54A-TC and the connection on the host. The Server Manager assigns service names to individual ports or groups of ports that connect the host interface to the server.

#### Load Balancing

When a connection is made to a service, the actual node for the connection is determined by load balancing. Load balancing is a process the server uses when more than one node offers the same service. Service nodes with the same names may be running different operating systems. Using the load balancing process, the server connects to the node with the highest rating for the service desired. This rating is typically based on the current loading on the nodes that offer the service.

## Multiple Sessions

The Ethernet Terminal Server allows each user to establish and maintain multiple sessions to one or more service nodes, up to a maximum of 255 per Ethernet Terminal Server. Only one session can be active at a time on each port. Through simple switching commands, the user can access his or her sessions without repeating a login dialog each time.

#### Local Mode and Service Mode

For the most part, the environment provided by the Ethernet Terminal Server is identical to that the user would experience if attached directly to the service node, with some exceptions. When operating in this mode, the user is said to be in Service Mode. Occasionally, such as during connection establishment, the user interacts directly with the Ethernet Terminal Server. When operating in this mode, the user is in Local Mode.

In Local Mode, the terminal input is interpreted directly by Ethernet Terminal Server as commands to be performed by the server.

Local Mode has three different levels of privilege; privileged, nonprivileged and secure. Privileged mode is provided for the Server Manager to control the environment of the server and the terminal users. Access to this mode is password protected. Nonprivileged commands allow the terminal user to control their service sessions, set their terminal characteristics and show server information. The Server Manager can set the server to secure mode on a per-terminal basis which further limits the commands users can enter to only those which directly relate to the user's own terminal.

The Server Manager environment is a logical extension of the user environment. The Server Manager is treated as a server user with a privileged status. The Server Manager sets a port to this status using a command which requires a password. This privileged status allows the Server Manager to enter commands not normally available to server users. These commands set server characteristics, provide control over server port usage, and provide the ability to control the user's access to the server and network services.

In Service Mode, the terminal input is passed directly to the connected service node with several exceptions. One exception, called the Local Switch Character, allows the user to enter Local Mode from Service Mode. The <BREAK> key may also be used for this function. Another exception, called the forward switch character, allows the user to switch between sessions without the need to enter Local Mode. The switch characters are disabled by default but may be enabled by command. Both CTRL/S and CTRL/Q are normally interpreted locally but flow control using these characters can be disabled.

#### Autoconnection

In conjunction with this function, a dedicated or preferred service can be specified for each terminal user.

If a dedicated service is specified, the Ethernet Terminal Server will attempt to connect to that service when a character is typed on the terminal keyboard or when an existing connection fails. In dedicated service mode, only one session is available. As this mode is designed to simulate a direct terminal connection, no Local Mode commands or messages are available to the terminal user. Ports with dedicated service can be automatically logged out of the server when the user logs out of the service node.

If a preferred service is specified, the Ethernet Terminal Server will attempt to connect to that service as with the dedicated service mode of operation. However, the terminal user can enter Local Mode and establish other sessions

#### Automatic Session Failover

If a service is available on two or more service nodes and a connection to a service fails, the server will attempt to connect the user to another service node offering the same service. The user does not have to be already connected to that service node. However, the user's context at the time of failure is not automatically restored and login to the new service is required.

#### Groups

Every terminal and service node in a LAT network is a member of one or more groups, which are specified by a list of numbers from 0 - 255. Groups allow an easy means of subdividing the network into what appears to be many smaller networks. A terminal user is only aware of the services that are offered by nodes in the same group(s).

The Server Manager can specify groups for the server. This filtering feature permits the Server Manager to control the amount of memory used by the server to maintain its node database. The Server Manager can also enable the server's own service node groups if the server is offering its own ports as services. The user can specify groups for his or her port that are a subset of the server group codes.

Groups provide a restrictive view of the network. This restricted view is mainly for user convenience and, although it also provides a form of security, it is not intended to be the primary form of access authorization or system security for a node.

#### Security

The Ethernet Terminal Server provides functions which enhance security features already available in the service nodes. Ethernet Terminal Server security includes the

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ability to lock a terminal's keyboard from other users, optional login protection, and nonprivileged Local Mode of operation as a default.

A user may lock the terminal using a lock password. This allows the user to leave sessions running at the terminal without fear of security violations. When a terminal is locked, all input from the terminal is ignored until the lock password is re-entered. The lock feature may be disabled by the Server Manager, but not on a per-port basis.

Each terminal port can be set to operate in a secure mode which causes all commands that relate to other users to be disabled for that port.

Login passwords can be enabled on a per-line basis by the Server Manager. If enabled, the terminal user must enter a login password to access server functions. If a dedicated service is specified, login protection is not available.

Ethernet Terminal Server users normally have access to the nonprivileged Local Mode. In this mode, users may only issue commands that affect their own terminal environment. The server has a privileged mode for Server Manager's use. This mode is password protected.

Ethernet Terminal Server Services may be established with password protection.

#### Hot Swap of Line Cards

Server line cards can be replaced individually while the server is running without affecting other ports. This increases uptime for users and provides an easy means of correcting certain hardware problems without taking down the entire server. Additional line cards (up to the limit for the hardware configuration) may be added while the server is running.

#### Online HELP Facility

A full online reference HELP facility is available. The server's HELP command provides information on the correct syntax and details about each command. It also presents information on topics not directly related to commands such as creating/switching multiple sessions.

## **Directory Service**

Any Ethernet Terminal Server user can obtain a directory of services available to that user with a SHOW SERVICES command. Services offered by nodes that do not share at least one group code with the server and user's port will not be displayed to the user.

## Permanent Characteristics

Each Ethernet Terminal Server has a unique software image on its downline load host. A database of permanent characteristics is kept within each image. These characteristics can be changed prior to downline load by the Server Manager or load host manager. Permanent characteristics are maintained for service and server parameters as well as per-port parameters.

### Port Parameter Configuration

Parameters governing the operation of an individual port can be modified and displayed by a nonprivileged user (logged into that port) interactively (from the user's terminal). In the privileged mode, a Server Manager can modify parameters for other users' ports or for the server as a whole.

A System/Network Manager can also use the Terminal Server Configurator (TSC) utility to make changes in a host-based Terminal Server image before being downline loaded to a server. Both server and port parameters can be modified interactively or by using TSC. Port parameters that can be set and displayed interactively and by TSC include: speed, character size, group codes, parity, terminal type, autobaud, modem, and password protection.

#### Terminal Operation

The Ethernet Terminal Server software supports the simultaneous operation of up to thirty-two asynchronous devices at speeds from 50 bps to 19.2K bps. The software also supports:

- · Full modem control support
- Data leads only support
- XON/XOFF flow control
- · CTS/RTS and flow control
- · Split speed (transmit and receive) terminal operation
- Block Mode transfers
- Automatic line speed detection for most of the supported line speeds
- DIGITAL Personal Computer file transfer
- Data transparency mode
- Ability to pass BREAK condition and port characteristics to service nodes

## **Terminals Supported**

The Ethernet Terminal Server software supports the following DIGITAL terminal devices that have keyboards:

Note: This product is NOT WARRANTED to support non-DIGITAL terminal devices or Personal Computers. However, terminals supporting VT200-like characteristics and Personal Computers supporting IBM PC, IBM PC/XT, and IBM PC/AT characteristics MAY operate with this product.

## **Modems Supported**

The Ethernet Terminal Server Software supports the following full-duplex asynchronous moderns for dial-in and/ or dial-out use:

DF01, DF02, DF03, DF112, DF124, and DF224

Ethernet Terminal Server also supports private or leasedline modem applications. However, connections to data switches are NOT WARRANTED but MAY operate with this product.

## Server Management

Several facilities exist for managing and troubleshooting server operation. The Server Manager in privileged mode can set up server identification information, change port characteristics, or fine tune the operating characteristics of the server. The Server Manager can also assign service names to groups of one or more ports which are connected to non-LAT hosts or modems. Troubleshooting facilities include diagnostic tests, a remote console feature, and online statistics.

A privileged user can diagnose Ethernet communications problems by looping messages from an Ethernet host and through the Ethernet hardware interface at the server. To diagnose terminal or port problems, users can execute a command to transmit test data to their terminal, or the Server Manager can send test data to any terminal.

The server maintains a variety of statistics and counters. These include the following: Ethernet data link statistics, LAT protocol statistics, and port error statistics. These data can be displayed and zeroed by the Server Manager. Server parameters that can be modified and displayed include the server identification, circuit timer, session limits, and login limits.

## Remote Server Management

The Ethernet Terminal Server implements the console carrier feature which enables access to the Ethernet Terminal Server Local Mode from a suitably configured Phase IV DECnet host on the same LAN. The usual set of Local Mode functions are available to a console carrier user. This capability provides a form of centralized server management and remote server diagnosis.

#### Communications

Ethernet Terminal Server software is designed to run on Ethernet Communications Server hardware exclusively which includes an Ethernet interface for connection to an Ethernet transceiver cable.

On the Ethernet Terminal Server, each port on the server can be set up by the Server Manager to operate using full-duplex modern control. The Ethernet Terminal Server is compatible with DIGITAL's family of moderns and with Bell 100 and 200 series moderns and their equivalents. A

BREAK feature is available and can be set on a per-port basis. This allows the Ethernet Terminal Server user to pass a BREAK indication to a service node. If the service node is an Ethernet Terminal Server, then BREAK can be asserted to a non-LAT host on the server connected via reverse LAT.

#### **Terminal Server Operation**

The Ethernet Communications Server hardware provides the necessary maintenance operation protocols for downline loading Terminal Server software from an Ethernet Phase IV DECnet load host, over the Ethernet, and into server memory. All software, including diagnostics, is downline loaded into the unit. In the event of certain hardware or software malfunctions, the unit will attempt to upline dump the Terminal Server memory and automatically reload the server software.

## Ethernet Terminal Server Configuration and Performance

The process of configuring the Ethernet Terminal Server is based primarily on tradeoffs of cost and performance within the realm of satisfying user application requirements. Network applications will range from low-speed, low-cost situations (e.g. connecting remote terminals through low-speed moderns) to those of relatively high performance (e.g., connecting high-speed local terminals to local hosts within a local area network or connecting is a function of the expected network traffic, the load on hosts to which terminals are connected, and resultant processing pursuant to the dedicated function of the unit. Thus performance depends on several factors:

- Number of terminals
- Number of systems on the LAN
- Number of active connections to service nodes from the server
- · Terminal speeds
- Terminal user applications
- Number and size of host buffers
- Terminal workload

The Terminal Server can sustain an aggregate character throughput of over 61,000 characters per second running 32 terminals at 19,200 bits per second (provided that no more than 4 service nodes are connected to the server concurrently).

In order to achieve a viable configuration, the user and/or a DIGITAL software specialist should perform a level of application analysis which addresses the factors above. The actual maximum data throughput cannot be calculated by multiplying the number of lines by the line speed, since many factors already discussed in this section may reduce the actual throughput.

## Restrictions on Ethernet Terminal Server Usage

While terminal connections using the Ethernet Terminal Server have been designed to simulate direct terminal

connections as much as possible, a few differences necessarily exist because of the nature of the product. Under most circumstances, these differences are not noticed by terminal users or service node application programs. However, applications which are directly dependent on the following functions may not operate as with a direct connection:

- Applications that depend on reading or setting the terminal speed, character size and parity by manipulating system data structures
- Applications that depend on an extremely fast response time (typically less than 200 ms) to operate
- Applications that utilize an alternate terminal driver in the service node
- For connections from a server to a host system, the LAT device created has an unpredictable name.
- For host-initiated connections, application programming will not be supported.
- Applications that expect incoming connections to have fixed device names.

#### MINIMUM HARDWARE REQUIRED

The Terminal Server software runs on the following Ethernet Communications Server packaged hardware:

 DECSA-DA Ethernet Communications Server hardware, including sixteen DCSAX-LC line cards (dual line RS-232-C asynchronous to 19.2K bps, full duplex) 32 physical ports

One of the following SHIELDED cables should be used with each of the physical lines on the line card:

- BC17D—Null modern cable for local connections requiring full modern control
- BC22D—Null modern cable for local connections
- BC22E—EIA extension cable for remote (modern) connections
- BC22R—Recommended null modem cable for host systems and other devices, including those which utilize CTS/RTS flow control
- BC17L—EIA adapter cable (for customers who supply their own terminal cables)

The Ethernet Communications Server hardware requires both a transceiver drop cable and either an Ethernet transceiver (H4000 for baseband or DECOM for broadband) or the Local Network Interconnect (DELNI) to connect to the Ethernet physical channel.

All software that runs on the Ethernet Terminal Server is downline loaded over the network from a DECnet-11M-PLUS, or DECnet-Micro/RSX load host. This node must be a valid RSX-11M-PLUS or Micro/RSX system.

- Disk space required for installation: 2300 blocks (1,178 Kbytes)
- Disk space required for use (permanent):2300 blocks (1,178 Kbytes)

These block counts refer to the disk space required on the system disk. The sizes are approximate; actual sizes may vary depending on the user's system environment, configuration, and software options selected.

The Terminal Server software license applies to the Terminal Server on which the server software runs, not to the host CPU upon which the server software is installed for downline loading.

RSX-11M-PLUS or Micro/RSX Operating System

Both the Operating System and DECnet are required for RSX-11M-PLUS or Micro/RSX downline load hosts.

Refer to the RSX-11M-PLUS and Micro/RSX Optional Software Cross Reference Tables (SPD 20.99.xx and SPD 20.95.xx) for the required versions.

#### **DESCRIPTION**

The DECserver 100 Terminal Server is a network terminal switch for Ethernet Local Area Networks. The DECserver 100 provides a convenient method to logically connect up to eight DIGITAL asynchronous terminals to one or more service nodes (hosts) on an Ethernet. Once the terminal is connected, the user can utilize application programs and utilities as they would through a terminal directly connected to a host via a DZ11, DMF32, or DH11 device, with a few exceptions. Thus, it may be possible to utilize the DECserver 100 to connect all terminals to service nodes in place of traditional interfaces, except for host console terminals.

The DECserver 100 implements the Local Area Transport (LAT) protocol for communication with service nodes that implement this protocol on the same Ethernet. This new interface has been optimized for high terminal I/O performance over an Ethernet, while reducing host CPU cycles required to handle interrupts. Hence, under most I/O loading conditions, a significant performance gain may be realized by using the DECserver 100 versus direct terminal connections via DZ11s.

Software that runs on the DECserver 100 is downline loaded over the network from a Phase IV DECnet load host running on the same Ethernet.

Terminal access using the DECserver 100 requires DECnet to be running in the same service node for RSX-11M-PLUS and Micro/RSX. LAT uses the Ethernet addressing mechanism to transport terminal messages.

For wide area network communications, terminal users can connect to a local service node running DECnet, where they can "SET HOST" to a remote system via the DECnet network terminal protocol. Note, too, that if this system has the requisite X.29 or SNA 3270 access routines, a terminal user could communicate to a remote SNA or X.25 host through the appropriate gateway and this intervening host. A DECserver 100 terminal user cannot communicate directly to remote hosts through DECnet Routers or X.25/SNA Gateways. Wide area network traffic will not provide the same high level of performance as local terminal connections, due to the additional DECnet and internet protocol overhead.

Features such as login load balancing, multiple terminal sessions, and automatic login failover can lead to greater user productivity.

#### Features

## Terminal Connection Management

Through the use of a simple command, users can establish a logical connection, called a session, to any local service node that implements the LAT protocol. This connection makes the terminal appear as if it were physically connected to the service node, and the terminal user can use standard system utilities and applications supported by that node. Each terminal connected to the server can connect to the same or a different service node on the Ethernet. Furthermore, several servers can be used to connect many terminals to one or more service nodes.

A service node can have one or more services that are offered to DECserver 100 users. Services and nodes are identified by name. Users always connect to services, not to nodes, although often one of the service names will be the node name.

#### Load Balancing

When a connection is made to a service, the actual node for the connection is determined by load balancing. Load balancing is a process the server uses when more than one node offers the same service. Service nodes do not have to be configured in a VAXcluster in order for load balancing to be used. Using the load balancing process, the server connects to the node with the highest rating for the service desired. This rating is based on the current loading, memory, CPU class, and number of users on the nodes that offer the service.

## **Multiple Sessions**

The DECserver 100 allows each user to establish and maintain up to six sessions to one or more service nodes, up to a maximum of 28 per DECserver 100 depending on the number of nodes in the server database. Only one session can be active at a time. Through simple switching commands, the user can access the different sessions without repeating a login dialog each time.



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#### Local Mode and Service Mode

For the most part, the environment provided by the DECserver 100 is identical to that the user would experience if attached directly to the service node. When operating in this mode, the user is said to be in Service Mode. Occasionally, such as during connection establishment, the user interacts directly with the DECserver 100. When operating in this mode, the user is in Local Mode.

In Local Mode, the terminal input is interpreted directly by DECserver 100 as commands to be performed by the server. Local Mode has two different levels of operation: nonprivileged and privileged. Nonprivileged commands allow the terminal users to control their service sessions, set terminal characteristics, and show server information. Privileged mode is provided for the Server Manager to control the environment of the server and of the terminal users. Access to this mode is password protected.

The Terminal Server Manager environment is a logical extension of the user environment. The Server Manager is treated as a server user with a privileged status. The Server Manager sets a terminal to this status using a command which requires a password. This privileged status allows the Server Manager to enter commands not normally available to server users. These commands set server characteristics, provide control over server port usage, and provide the ability to control the user's access to the server and network services.

In Service Mode, the terminal input is passed directly to the connected service node with several exceptions. One exception, called the Local Switch Character, allows the user to enter Local Mode from Service Mode. Other exceptions, called the Forward and Backward Switch Characters, allow the user to switch between sessions without the need to enter Local Mode. The switch characters are disabled by default but may be enabled by command. Both CTRL/S and CTRL/Q are normally interpreted locally but flow control using these characters can be disabled.

## Autoconnection

Autoconnection is a function that automatically connects a user terminal to a service node when connection failures occur or upon user login to the server. In conjunction with this function, a dedicated or preferred service can be specified for each terminal user.

If a dedicated service is specified, the DECserver 100 will attempt to connect to that service when a character is typed on the terminal keyboard or when an existing connection fails. In dedicated service mode, only one session is available. As this mode is designed to simulate a direct terminal connection, no Local Mode commands or messages are available to the terminal user. Ports with dedicated service can be automatically logged out of the server when the user logs out of the service node.

If a preferred service is specified, the DECserver 100 will attempt to connect to that service as with the dedicated service mode of operation. However, the terminal user can enter Local Mode and establish other sessions.

#### Automatic Session Failover

If a service is available on two or more service nodes and a connection to a service fails, the server will attempt to connect the user to another service node offering the same service. Autoconnection must be enabled for this feature to work. The user does not have to be already connected to that service node. Furthermore, the user's context at the time of failure is not automatically restored and login to the new service is required.

#### Groups

Every terminal and service node in a LAT network is a member of one or more groups. These groups are identified by numbers called group codes. Group codes allow an easy means of subdividing the network into what appears to be many smaller networks. A terminal user is only aware of the services that are offered by nodes in the same group(s).

A privileged user can change the group(s) in which a terminal is a member. Group codes provide a restrictive view of the network. This restricted view is mainly for user convenience and, although it also provides a form of security, it is not intended to be the primary form of access authorization or system security for a node.

## Security

The DECserver 100 provides functions which enhance security features already available in the service nodes. DECserver 100 security includes the ability to lock a terminal's keyboard from other users, optional login protection, and nonprivileged Local Mode of operation as a default.

A user may lock the terminal using a lock password. This allows the user to leave sessions running at the terminal without fear of security violations. When a terminal is locked, all input from the terminal is ignored until the lock password is re-entered.

Login passwords can be enabled on a per-line basis by the privileged user. If enabled, the terminal user must enter a login password to access server functions. If a dedicated service is specified, login protection is not available.

DECserver 100 users normally have access to the nonprivileged Local Mode. In this mode, users may only issue commands that affect their own terminal environment. The server has a privileged mode for Server Manager's use. The mode is password protected.

#### Online HELP Facility

A limited online HELP facility is available to remind users of command syntax. It is not intended as a replacement for the documentation set.

## **Directory Service**

### **DECSRIPTION**

MicroPower/Pascal-RSX is an RSX-11M/M-PLUS layered product which belongs to the MicroPower/Pascal product family. MicroPower/Pascal is a modular executive and software development package for PDP-11 (Q-BUS) based microcomputer applications. It includes software components needed to create, build and debug/test concurrent real-time application software running stand-alone on a target runtime microcomputer system.

MicroPower/Pascal is offered in different packaging options according to the Host Development System required. MicroPower/Pascal-RSX requires RSX host development systems. This SPD describes only MicroPower/Pascal-RSX.

MicroPower/Pascal-RSX supports application software development using two distinct hardware environments:

- Host RSX development system
- Target PDP-11 (Q-BUS only) runtime system for the microcomputer application

The application software is created and linked with the appropriate MicroPower/Pascal runtime software components on the host development system. - 6. A directory listing of media, when included; label media carefully

# SUGGESTIONS FOR SUBMITTING TAPES WITH SPRs

To insure timely processing of SPRs submitted with tapes, please follow the suggestions below:

- 1. Use either a floppy or a magnetic tape.
- 2. If a magnetic tape is used, it should be either 800, 1600, or 6250 bpi.
- 3. Include a directory with each tape submitted.
- 4. Label each tape with the following information:
  - a. Customer name
  - b. Tape format
  - c. bpi
  - d. Track
  - e. Preprinted number of the SPR submitted with the tape
- 5. Remove from the tape any unnecessary or confidential files.

# DIGITAL SOFTWARE LICENSING



DATA SHEET

This data sheet explains what software licenses are and why customers must obtain a software license to run any item of DIGITAL proprietary software.

DIGITAL does not sell software; DIGITAL offers software under a license agreement. DIGITAL has a license agreement for source software and object software. Since DIGITAL software programs are made available primarily in object code, this data sheet focuses on the purchase of object programs.

### Introduction to Software Licensing

When DIGITAL hardware is purchased, all rights of ownership (legally called "title") to the hardware pass to the customer. This is not the case with software. DIGITAL regards software as proprietary information. Since software is easily reproduced, it must be legally protected from improper copying. Therefore, DIGITAL uses a combination of trade secret and copyright legal protection for software. DIGITAL protects its investment by retaining title to its software at all times and requires anyone wishing to use it to obtain a license.

### How DIGITAL Licenses Software

The license agreement for object programs is contained in DIGITAL's standard Terms and Conditions of Sale and Corporate Volume Purchase Agreements instead of as a separate agreement. Therefore, when software products are purchased under DIGITAL's Terms of Sale, the software license agreement is made at the same time.

### Key Principles of the License Agreement

Object code is licensed for single use. This means obtaining a license for a product allows the associated software to be used on the "single" CPU on which it was first installed. Other key points are as follows:

- If the licensed CPU temporarily malfunctions, the software may be run on another machine while the CPU is down.
- Copies of the software may be made for backup purposes if appropriate proprietary and copyright notices are included.
- The software may be modified or merged with other software if appropriate proprietary and copyright notices are included.
- The software may be used by the customer's employees and its agents directly concerned with the internal use, but may not be made available to anyone else.

### Modification to the Software Product

Any modification to licensed software does not exempt the product from DIGITAL license terms. Every line of code from a software product falls under the terms of the license. Only those modifications that are not part of the original software are the customer's property. It is important to note that warranty on the product is limited to the original software supplied by DIGITAL.

### Transferability of Licensed Software Products

License Transfer - A license agreement does not automatically allow transfer of licensed software to another party or another CPU. If the customer intends to sell the licensed CPU and pass on the software with the sale or move the software onto another CPU, permission must be obtained from DIGITAL. A case-by-case License Transfer is required to relicense the software.

Software Sublicensing - DIGITAL customers with a purchase agreement authorizing sublicensing, such as OEMs, may transfer licensed object products to their customers without a License Transfer. A valid sublicense, executed by an OEM with its customer, gives the OEM's customer the same license rights and responsibilities as a license agreement made directly with DIGITAL.

# Source Software

Sources are only available for selected products. A license agreement for source software must be separately executed for each facility/location which intends to purchase sources in machine-readable, listing, or microfiche form. Further information and availability of sources can be found in the applicable Software Product Description (SPD).

### Software Warranty

Each licensed software product offered has an SPD describing the warranty commitment for the product. Software products under DIGITAL warranty must conform to the description provided for a 90-day period, which generally begins upon product installation or 30 days after delivery. All other products are provided AS IS, without warranty. The SPD clearly states under which warranty category the product falls.

### Purchasing the License for the Software Product

A license must be obtained for each CPU on which the licensed software will be used (unless otherwise specified by DIGITAL).

A Single-use License for object code is generally ordered according to the type/classification of the CPU or system configuration intended to run the product. Further information and availability can be found in the applicable SPD.

### Software Product

A license is a prerequisite to purchase the associated software. The Media and Documentation Option for a product is ordered according to media type. Further information and availability of media can be found in the applicable SPD.

# Purchasing Software Product Revisions/Updated Versions

If a licensed customer is not covered by a product service agreement, updated versions can be purchased when they are made generally available. Updated versions are ordered according to media type. A customer can also choose to run updated versions on additional CPUs, but not purchase multiple media distributions. If this is the case, the Software Revision Right-to-Copy option must be purchased for each CPU which runs the updated version.

### **Software Product Services**

A licensed customer can purchase annual product service agreements to receive updated versions on media when available. A customer may choose to copy updated versions onto additional CPUs during this service agreement period. In this case, the software Service Right-to-Copy must be purchased for each CPU which runs the updated version. Further information and availability can be found in the applicable SPD.
