Preface

This publication provides technical information about the IBM Personal Computer 3278/79 Emulation Adapter Card. This manual describes the hardware design and provides interface information for the IBM Personal Computer and IBM Personal Computer XT.

The information in this publication is for reference, and is intended for hardware and software designers, programmers, engineers, and interested persons who need to understand the design and operation of the IBM Personal Computer.

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
Section 1. IBM Personal Computer 3278/79 Emulation Adapter

Introduction

The IBM Personal Computer 3278/79 Emulation Adapter card supports emulation of the base 3270 data stream and controls communication between the IBM Personal Computer and an IBM control unit. All system control signals and voltage requirements are provided through a 2 by 31 position card edge tab. A coaxial connector (type BNC) joins this adapter card to the control unit.

The adapter card will accept, decode, and execute commands issued from the control unit or the IBM Personal Computer. All information from the control unit is sent in the form of a 12-bit frame over a coaxial link. Transition checks include mid-bit transition and transmission parity.

I/O Address Locations

This table describes the I/O address locations for the registers that define and control the emulation adapter.

I/O Address Locations

Interrupt/Status Register (2D0)

This 8-bit register on the emulation adapter is accessed by the IBM Personal Computer. Bits 0 through 5 are Interrupt (I) bits, which are set by the emulation adapter and reset by the IBM Personal Computer. Bits 6 and 7 are Status (S) bits, which are set and reset by the adapter.

Note: Interrupt Level-2 is used by the emulation adapter.

Interrupt/Status Register

Visual/Sound Register (2D1)

This 8-bit register is set and reset by the emulation adapter except for the sound alarm (bit 6) which is reset by any Write operation from the IBM Personal Computer to this register with any data. No other bits are affected by a Write operation from the IBM Personal Computer to this address. Each time this register is loaded by the adapter logic, bit 2 in the Interrupt/Status Register is set.

Visual/Sound Register

Cursor Address Register (2D2, 2D3)

This 16-bit register is internal to and is set by the emulation adapter. This register requires two addresses and can be read by the IBM Personal Computer. This register contains the current value of the I/O Address Counter. In 3278/79 emulation mode, this register indicates the location of the cursor.

Control Register (2D4)

This is an 8-bit Read/Write register internal to the emulation adapter and accessed by the IBM Personal Computer. It requires one address to read and write.

Control Register

This bit is set by the IBM Personal Computer, causing the emulation adapter to become enabled and on-line. After this bit is set, the first POLL causes a POR response to be sent to the control unit. The bit is initially reset during hardware power—on. It is also reset by the RESET command or by the IBM Personal Computer. When this bit is reset, the emulation adapter ignores all transmissions from the control unit. Thus, it causes the control unit to timeout and set the "GO TO SLEEP" latch for that line.

- Bit 1 Reserved.
- Bit 2 Reserved.
- Bit 3 This bit is set by the IBM Personal Computer and notifies the emulation adapter that the Scan Code Register has been loaded. This data is then handled as a keystroke. This bit is reset by a POLL ACK or RESET command from the control unit.
- Bit 4 Reserved.
- Bit 5 This bit is set by the IBM Personal Computer. It allows the IBM Personal Computer to do limited functional testing of the IBM Personal Computer 3278/79 Emulation Adapter card. The coaxial link is automatically disabled.

Bit 6 Reserved.

Bit 7 This bit is initially reset by the hardware power—on cycle. Then it is set and reset by the IBM Personal Computer. Setting this bit inhibits the sending of interrupts to the IBM Personal Computer, but it does not prevent setting the interrupt/status bit (0–5). If an interrupt is set when the Mask bit is on, subsequent removal of the Mask bit will allow that interrupt to pass through to the IBM Personal Computer.

Scan Code Register (2D5)

This 8-bit register is internal to the emulation adapter and is set and reset by the IBM Personal Computer. This register requires one address.

In 3278/79 Emulation mode, this register is used by the IBM Personal Computer to send a keystroke code to the control unit. The IBM Personal Computer will not change the contents of this register if bit 3 of the Control Register is set.

Note: The scan code placed in this register must be the ones—complement of the data to be sent to the control unit.

Terminal ID Register (2D6)

This 8-bit register is internal to the emulation adapter and is set and reset by the IBM Personal Computer. It requires one address.

This register *must* be set by the IBM Personal Computer *before* enabling the coaxial link.

Note: The Terminal ID placed in this register must be the ones—complement of the data to be sent to the control unit.

Memory Address Locations

There are 8KB of RAM reserved for the emulation adapter. The beginning address is CE000; the ending address is CFFFF.
