# Chapter 1 General Information

1-1	SCOPE OF THIS MANUAL	The purpose of this Measurement Guide is to introduce the basic operation of the Scorpion <sup>®</sup> MS462XX Vector Network Measurement System and help lessen the time required to become proficient at performing basic measurements. The procedures in this manual assume a working knowledge of, and a familiarity with, vector network analyzers. Refer to the other manuals supplied with the MS462XX for more detailed explanations and procedures.
<i>1-2</i>	INTRODUCTION	This chapter provides information to familiarize the user with the basic MS462XX Vector Network Measurement System. Included is information about related manuals, and the available models and options.
1-3	RELATED MANUALS	This manual is one of a six manual set consisting of this Measurement Guide, the <i>MS462XX Application Guide</i> (Anritsu part number 10410-00214), the <i>MS462XX Operation Manual</i> (Anritsu part number 10410-00203), the <i>MS462XX Programming Manual</i> (10410-00204), the <i>MS462XX Maintenance Manual</i> (10410-00205), and the <i>MS462XX GPIB Quick Reference Guide</i> (10410-00206).

# *Chapter 2 System Overview*

**2-1** INTRODUCTION The MS462XX provides an intuitive user interface based on measurement applications. The display area contains both data and menu selection information. The menu selection information is accessed with the eight soft keys adjacent to the display. The remaining front panel keys provide selection of the general system controls and settings. A menu tree overview (Section 2-8) provides a brief description of the selections associated with the major front panel keys.

# **2-2 CONVENTIONS** Throughout this Measurement Guide, path names may be used to represent the keystrokes for a desired action or procedure. The path name begins with a front panel key selection, followed by additional front panel or softkey selections, each separated by a forward slash (/). Front panel key names and soft keys are presented in the manual as they are on the system, that is, in initial caps or all uppercase letters as appropriate. For example, the following path name representation displays the system model number, serial number, current software version, and installed options:

Utility/INSTRUMENT STATE PARAMETERS/SYSTEM

Following the path above, the user would press the Utility front panel key, followed by the INSTRUMENT STATE PARAMETERS softkey, then the SYSTEM softkey to display the system information.

Individual steps within a procedure may also be presented as sequentially numbered steps for clarity. Again, front panel key names and soft keys are presented in the manual as they are on the system. For example, the following procedure displays the system model number, serial number, current software version, and installed options:

- 1. Press the Utility front panel key.
- 2. Select the menu soft keys as follows:

INSTRUMENT STATE PARAMETERS SYSTEM

In some procedures, an optional or alternative step may be included and will be identified by the word optional in parenthesis, as below:

1. (optional) Perform a calibration for flatness using a power meter.

# **2-3 FRONT PANEL** The MS462XX front panel is organized into three main areas: the display, the user interface, and the test port connector areas. The MS462XX front panel view is shown below for reference.




Figure 2-1. MS462XX Vector Network Measurement System

While the test port connector area is straightforward, the following sections provide more details about the display and user interface areas.

**2-4 DISPLAY AREA** The display can be partitioned into data and menu display areas, separated by a vertical line. The menu display area provides the user interface for the MS462XX and is the focus of this Measurement Guide. The menu display area can be removed by pressing the Clr key in the Data Entry area on the front panel.

The MS462XX organizes measurement capabilities into applications accessible from the applications key (Appl) on the front panel of the system. The following illustration is a typical display following the selection of the Appl key.




Figure 2-2. MS462XX Typical Display

#### FRONT PANEL KEYS




Figure 2-3. MS462XX Front Panel Keys

**2-5** FRONT PANEL KEYS The MS462XX user interface area (Figure 2-3) consists of eight soft keys, next to the display, and six groups of labeled keys. The labeled key groups are Data Entry, Channels, Enhancement, Stimulus, System, and a group consisting of the Application, Measurement, Display, Marker, and Hold keys. Refer to the following front panel view.




Figure 2-4. MS462XX Labeled Keys

**2-6** LABELED KEYS The labeled keys provide access to the general system interface. These keys are organized into Data Entry, Channels, Enhancement, Stimulus, and System selections. Selection of the keys in this area typically provides choices in the menu display area. Figure 2-4 shows an example of these user interface keys.

The **Data Entry** keys are used to enter or clear numerical data for the active parameter.

The **Channel** keys, in conjunction with the Meas and Display keys, control the display of the measurement results. The currently active channel is indicated by the channel key LED in the upper left-hand corner of the key.

The **Enhancement** keys are used for sequencing menus, performing measurement calibrations, controlling the Average, Smoothing, and IF Bandwidth functions, and accessing system utilities.

The **Stimulus** keys provide frequency-sweep control, RF power control, and control over measurement configuration.

The **System** keys control printing, system reset to defaults, and saving and recalling stored system setups.

#### LABELED KEYS

The **Application** key displays a series of menus that provide functions for measurement applications.

The **Measurement** key displays a series of menus used to select S-parameters.

The **Display** key displays a series of menus used to choose graph types, set scales, set the reference plane, store trace memory and manipulate limit lines.

The **Marker** key displays a series of menus used to set and manipulate marker frequency, power, time, and distance.

The **Hold** key toggles the system in and out of the hold mode, or triggers a sweep.





Figure 2-5. Softkey Example

**2-7 SOFT KEYS** The eight soft keys are used to make selections from the menu display area, just to the left of the keys. The reaction of the system to the selection of these soft keys depends on the choices in the menu display area. Figure 2-5 shows an example of this user interface.

#### FOUR-CHANNEL DISPLAY

**2-9** FOUR-CHANNEL DISPLAY The flexible four channel display of the MS462XX can be used by all applications to display the measurement results. This section explains how to take advantage of the four-channel display capability.

The four channel display is controlled by the selection of the Ch 1, Ch 2, Ch 3, or Ch 4 keys in the Channels area of the front panel. There is an LED in the upper left-hand corner of each of the four channel keys to easily identify the currently active channel.

The four Channel keys, in concert with the Meas and Display keys, provide the mechanism for controlling the display of the measurement results.

The Meas key allows the selection of the desired S-parameter. The S-parameters available for selection are:

Following is a typical procedure for configuring measurement results using the four-channel display capability.

If using Dual Channels, remember that the GRAPH TYPE must be the same for both channels.

- 2. Specify the Active Channel by selecting the Ch 1, Ch 2, Ch 3, or Ch 4 key.
- 3. Specify the S-parameter for Display:

4. Specify the Graph Type for the active channel:

**Display/GRAPH TYPE** 

5. Adjust the Scale for the active channel:

Display/SCALE (or Display/AUTOSCALE)

6. As required, repeat steps 2 through 5 for the remaining measurement channels.

This procedure for configuring the display is demonstrated throughout the following measurement procedures.

#### NOTE

When using Dual Channels and Overlay Dual Channels for channels 1 & 3, the same dual channel display is configured for channels 2 & 4. Toggle between the two dual channel displays by selecting channel 1 (or channel 3) and then channel 2 (or channel 4).

# Chapter 3 Calibration

## **3-1** INTRODUCTION

The MS462XX provides flexible calibration capabilities accessible from the calibration key (Cal) on the front panel of the system. This organization allows for straightforward and intuitive calibrations that provide the foundation for performing accurate S-parameter measurements by removing system errors proceeding the actual measurements.

This chapter presents the primary calibration techniques available for the MS462XX. Typically, an application is chosen first (see Chapter 4, Applications) before performing a calibration. Following a calibration, the MS462XX is ready to perform accurate measurements. The front panel Cal key contains an LED that illuminates when a calibration is applied.

This chapter contains discussions, examples, and procedures related to the following calibrations:

Each calibration discussion shows a typical calibration procedure. Once a typical calibration is mastered, explore the different calibration options to become familiar with each calibration's powerful capability.

# **3-2** CALIBRATION COEFFICIENTS

Standard Feature

#### NOTE

Once loaded, the calibration coefficients reside in memory until a Default-0 keyboard sequence is performed. Every calibration kit contains calibration coefficients that help ensure the most accurate calibration. These coefficients must be loaded into the MS462XX before proceeding with a calibration. If these coefficients are not loaded, the MS462XX uses the default values contained in memory.

The following procedure loads and displays the calibration coefficients from a floppy disk into the MS462XX memory.

- 1. Place the calibration coefficients diskette into the floppy drive of the MS462XX.
- 2. Press the Cal front panel key.
- 3. Select the menu soft keys as follows:

MORE

COMPONENT UTILITIES

INSTALL KIT INFO FROM FLOPPY DISK

- 4. The MS462XX will install the calibration coefficients into memory.
- 5. Select: DISPLAY COAXIAL INFORMATION
- 6. Select either the male or female connector type of the calibration kit to view the corresponding calibration coefficients.

This completes the procedure for loading and displaying the calibration coefficients using the MS462XX.

#### 3-3 OSLT CALIBRATION

#### NOTE

Pressing **CIr** in the Data Entry area of the Front Panel aborts the calibration process.

#### NOTE

Include Isolation when there is poor isolation (< 100 dB) in the test setup. Calibration using the standard OSLT technique includes the measurement of an Open, a Short, a broadband Load, and a Throughline connection. These standards allow removal of system errors from the measurements that follow. This procedure calibrates the MS462XX using the OSLT technique.

- 1. Press the Cal front panel key.
- 2. Select the menu soft keys as follows:

6. Specify the Port 1 Connector:

PORT 1 CONN = TYPE N (F)

7. Specify the Port 2 Connector:

PORT 2 CONN = TYPE N (M)

8. Specify the Test Signal Power Levels:

TEST SIGNALS SOURCE 1 POWER = +7 dB RESUME CAL START CAL

9. Follow the directions for connecting calibration devices.

10. Press the Save/Recall front panel key, and the following soft keys:

SAVE

FRONT PANEL SETUP AND CAL DATA ON HARD DISK CREATE NEW FILE

11. Specify a name using the front panel knob. When complete, select DONE.

This completes the procedure for calibrating the MS462XX using the OSLT technique.

**3-4** AUTOCAL TWO-PORT CALIBRATION

The AutoCal module (36581XXF/1) is an automatic calibrator that provides fast, repeatable, and accurate coaxial two-port calibrations. The MS462XX AutoCal feature internally controls the AutoCal module to perform an OSLT calibration, thereby eliminating the requirement for an external computer and increasing the speed of the calibration.

These powerful features support fast, repeatable, and accurate coaxial two-port calibrations.

#### **AUTOCAL TWO-PORT CALIBRATION**

#### AutoCal Characterization Files

The AutoCal Characterization Files contain the characterization data for the AutoCal module. The characterization data can be generated at either the factory or as a result of an AutoCal Characterization using the MS462XX. The following procedures show how to use the characterization files most effectively.

Using Characterization Files from the factory-supplied floppy diskette:

- 1. Insert the factory disk into the floppy drive on the MS462XX.
- 2. Copy the characterization file to the hard drive of the MS462XX.

Save/Recall/GENERAL DISK UTILITIES/FLOPPY DISK UTIL-ITIES/COPY FILES TO HARD DISK

- ALL TYPES (\*.\*)
- 3. The MS462XX retrieves the files from the disk and displays the files to copy.
- 4. Select the softkey beside the file with the \*.ACD format.
- 5. The MS462XX copies the characterization file to the hard drive.

Once the characterization file is loaded, select the menu soft keys as follows:

The MS462XX displays the AutoCal Characterization Information.

This completes the procedure for working with the AutoCal Characterization Files using the MS462XX.

Press the front panel keys and menu soft keys as follows: Utility/AUTOCAL CHARACTERIZATION 3. Select the box type: SELECT BOX TYPE - 2 PORT 4. Specify Port Configuration: SELECT PORTS: (L=1,R=2 or R=1,L=2 where L is for Left and R is for Right on the AutoCal Module) 5. Specify the Averaging Values: **AVERAGING REFLECTION = 4** LOAD = 4THRU = 4RETURN CONTINUE 6. Following the CONTINUE selection, the MS462XX proceeds to characterize the AutoCal Module using the previously performed OSLT calibration. This characterization process can be time-consuming, depending upon the averaging selections. 7. Save the characterized AutoCal data for later retrieval:

8. Specify a name using the front panel knob, and select DONE.




Figure 3-2. MS462XX with Four-Port AutoCal Module

The following display shows a bandpass filter response after performing a discrete fill calibration.




Figure 3-3. Discrete Calibration Example Display

In this example, more data points are required in the passband than in the rejection bands. In this way, measurement speed is optimized by limiting the amount of data points to only those of interest. The passband for this measurement is 1930 MHz to 1990 MHz.

#### **3-11** ADAPTER REMOVAL

**Standard Feature** 

While it is usually desired to perform a two-port calibration with mating connectors of the same type, this is sometimes not possible based on the connectors of the device to be tested. Examples of this include:

- **D** The DUT has one N port and one GPC-3.5 port.
- □ The DUT has two female SMA ports and it is not desired to use a non-zero length thru.
- □ The DUT has one fixtured port and one SMA port.

What these examples share is that completing the thru line between the effective test ports requires some kind of adapter. Since the adapter has some phase length, loss, and mismatch, its effects should be removed for a high quality cal. Adapter removal is a utility to characterize this adapter and remove its effects.




Figure 3-4. Adapter Removal Block Diagram

The concept of the adapter removal relies on the existence of two related sets of reference planes—one set on either side of the adapter (see Figure 3-4). Assuming one can perform a full calibration at each set of reference planes, there is enough information to extract the behavior of the adapter itself. When the calibration is being performed at the reference planes on the left (between ports 1 and 2'), the adapter behavior is embedded in the characteristics of port 2'. Similarly, when the calibration is being performed between ports 1' and 2, the adapter behavior is embedded in that of port 1'. Since each of these two calibrations involve mating connector types, these are far easier to perform than the direct 1-2 calibration. It will not be shown here, but the use of the two calibrations provide nearly enough information to extract the parameters of the adapter itself.

Figure 3-4 shows the structure of the adapter removal calibration. Two calibrations are performed at the two sets of reference planes shown (between ports 1 and 2', and between 1' and 2), which allows a determination of the adapter behavior. After the adapter removal, the resulting calibration will be between Ports 1 and 2.

Performing an Adapter Removal There are two caveats to this procedure. First, only the S21S12 products of the adapter can be determined from this procedure, not the two transmission terms individually. However, since only the product is needed to de-embed the adapter effects, this is not much of a problem. Most adapters are passive and reciprocal anyway, so the individual terms could be determined if necessary. Second, there is a complex square root operation involved, so a root determination is necessary. To help this, the user must enter a guess as to the electrical length of the adapter (in ps of delay). The guess need not be very accurate, just within the correct half plane. At 2 GHz, this means the error in delay entry should be less than 125 ps to ensure the correct root is selected. In general the error must be less than 1/(4f) where f is the highest frequency being used.




Figure 3-5. Menu and Help Screen for an Adapter Removal

Two full two-port calibrations must be performed and those calibrations (plus front panel setups) must be stored to the current directory on a floppy or hard disk (usually the hard disk is used greater for speed). The setups for the two calibrations should be the same in terms of frequency range and number of points. Upon entering the adapter removal utility, an estimate for the electrical length of the adapter must be entered as well as the location of the two calibrations. Once this is done, the utility will generate and apply a new calibration by removing the adapter effects. The menu and help screen for this procedure are shown in Figure 3-5.

MS462XX MG

*Example:* The following example should help illustrate the use of the adapter removal utility. An adapter was constructed with about 3 dB of loss and 180 degrees of phase shift at 3 GHz. This leads to an estimate of the delay length of:

$$\phi = \omega \tau \qquad \qquad \tau = \frac{\phi}{\omega} = \frac{\pi}{2\pi (3 \times 10^9)} \approx 167 \rho s$$

Since the loss of this adapter is substantial, one could not simply use reference plane extensions to remove the phase shift and hope for an accurate result.

The two calibrations described earlier were performed and stored to the hard disk and the adapter removal was executed. A thru was then connected without the adapter in place. Normally this would not be possible (since the whole reason for using the adapter removal was for situations when a thru would be difficult), but this example adapter was constructed just to show that the algorithm functions correctly. The results are shown in Fig. 3.




Figure 3-6. Result of the Adapter Removal

The thru without the adapter was connected after executing the adapter removal utility and the near-perfect thru values for S21 show that the algorithm successfully removed the adapter from the calibration. As expected, the thru without the adapter shows nearly zero insertion loss and phase shift, and a very good match. Any residuals are largely due to cable flex. Had this connection been made with one of the initial two calibrations applied, S21 would have shown about 3 dB of gain since the adapter had been built into each calibration.

# **FLEXIBLE CALIBRATION**

<b>3-12</b> FLEXIBLE CALIBRATION Standard Feature	Flexible Calibration mode allows an existing two, three, or four-port calibra- tion to be quickly subdivided so that only the required measurements are used. An important point is that the system will automatically determine which error terms must be included to perform the correction as best as possible within the constraints supplied. The rules for the system's decisions can be described as follows:

- $\label{eq:states} \square \ \ If a \ reflection \ term \ (S_{ii}) \ is \ activated, \ include \ all \ reflectometer \ co-efficients \ for \ that \ port. \ If \ S_{ii} \ is \ isolated, \ the \ calibration \ is \ treated \ like \ a \ one-port \ reflection-only \ calibration$
- $\hfill\square$  If a transmission term is activated along with its matching reflection terms (e.g.,  $S_{12},\,S_{11}$  and  $S_{22}$ ), activate the load match terms

The net effect is, if all four parameters associated with a two-port calibration are specified, a full two-port correction will be enabled. If only  $S_{ii}$  and  $S_{ji}$  are activated, then a 1-path, two-port calibration will be enabled.

#### NOTE

Although the system can be fairly intelligent in which terms it uses, it knows little about the DUT. You can help by specifying not only the measurements that are needed, but also the ones that are tightly connected to the desired measurement and are not on the measurement's list.




Figure 3-7. Three-Port VNA Measuring a Three-Port Device

Figure 3-7 shows a three-port device consisting of a one-port resonator/antenna and a two-port, sub-DUT. If leakage is not of interest, you would really want to measure only five parameters instead of nine. The idea is to avoid measuring more than is needed.

Example Using Flexible Calibration The three-port DUT has an integrated antenna, to be treated as a single port, and an amplifier path, to be treated as a separate two-port device. The following will illustrate that in partially connected DUTs, such as this, there is no accuracy penalty in using the Flexible Calibration mode.




Figure 3-8. Example Comparing Flexible Calibration Results with Full Three-Port Calibration Results

A full three-port calibration and measurements over the 700 MHz to 1000 MHz frequency range were performed. Both the full three-port calibration results and the Flexible Calibration results, defined as CUSTOM CAL with the S11, S12, S21, S22, and S33 parameters enabled, are compared on an overlay in Figure 3-8 below.

The light trace is the full three-port calibration result while the dark trace uses the Flexible Calibration method. Aside from some minor differences due to trace noise (measurement done with a very wide IFBW with no averaging), the traces overlay completely. As expected there is no difference, but only five parameters were measured per cycle instead of nine. This method works for partially connected DUTs, such as those discussed previously.

Other application notes (e.g., *Three and Four Port S-parameter Measurements*, 11410-00279) or Anritsu customer service can be consulted for more information on the various types of calibrations possible.

### 3-13 ACCURACY ENHANCEMENT

Standard Feature

Flat Test Port Power Calibration

#### NOTE

If a network or cables are placed between Port x and the power sensor, the instrument will adjust the source power level to obtain the desired output power at the sensor input. Keep in mind that if the network is lossy, the source may not be able to achieve the leveled power desired at the sensor input resulting in ALC LVLD FAIL errors. The maximum leveled source output is typically +7 dBm.

While the MS462XX VNMS is a highly accurate measurement platform, there are calibration procedures which can be performed to further enhance the accuracy of the system. These strategies are detailed in this section.

This calibration is performed with a power meter connected to the dedicated GPIB bus of MS462XX. The power sensor is then connected to the appropriate test port and the measurement process can begin.

- 1. Press the Power front panel key
- 2. Select which source (source 1 or source 2) to perform the calibration with.

SOURCE 1 SETUP

3. Set the selected source to the desired power level.

SOURCE 1 POWER = 0 dBm

4. Select the flat test port power calibration

FLAT TEST PORT POWER CAL

- 5. Ensure that the power meter is calibrated and zeroed. Supported power meters include the Anritsu 2430A Series, the HP 437 and HP 438, and the Gigatronics Model 8540.
- 6. Connect the power sensor to the test port.
- 7. Select the number of power points to be measured. For best results, one power point should be measured per sweep point, otherwise interpolation will occur and accuracy will be reduced.

MEASURE 1 POWER POINT EVERY 1 POINT(S)

8. Enter the target source power. For best results, the target source power should be equal to the source power set previously.

POWER TARGET = 0 dBm BEGIN CAL

- 9. Wait until the process is complete. This measurement may take a few minutes, especially with older power meters which are slower in the acquisition process.
- 10. Save the Calibration if desired.

This completes the flat test port power calibration.

## **ACCURACY ENHANCEMENT**

#### **Receiver Calibration**

In order for the MS462XX to measure absolute power, a receiver calibration is necessary. If this step is performed following a flat test port power calibration, then the accuracy of the source is essentially being transferred to the receiver. This calibration is applicable to intermodulation distortion (IMD) and harmonics applications in standard and mixer device types.

To perform a receiver calibration:

11. Select the frequency range of interest by pressing the Freq front panel key.

Performing the receiver cal over the full frequency range allows one cal to satisfy many different frequency ranges without the need for multiple calibrations.

NOTE

- START = 10 MHz STOP = 6 GHz
- 12. Select the number of points by pressing the Config front panel key

DATA POINTS POINTS

13. Press the Power front panel key.

RECEIVER CAL

14. Select the receiver port.

RECEIVER PORT = PORT 2

15. Select the source port.

SOURCE PORT = PORT 1

16. Connect a throughline between port 1 and port 2.

**BEGIN CAL** 

This completes the receiver calibration procedure.

# Chapter 4 Applications

# 4-1 INTRODUCTION

The MS462XX organizes measurement capabilities into applications accessible from the applications key (Appl) on the front panel of the system. This measurement organization allows for straightforward and intuitive measurement operation and a convenient method for switching between different measurement applications.

Following the application setup, it is best to perform a calibration to remove system errors before proceeding with actual measurements.

This chapter contains discussions, examples, and procedures related to the following applications:

- □ Noise Figure
- □ Intermodulation Distortion (IMD)
- □ Harmonic
- □ Swept Power Gain Compression (SPGC)
- **Given Set Prequency Gain Compression (SFGC)**
- Time Domain
- □ Mixer Measurements
- **□** Frequency Translated Group Delay
- □ Power Sweep

Each application discussion shows a typical measurement result. The procedures document the steps used to achieve this typical measurement result.

Once a typical measurement is mastered, explore the different measurement configurations for each application to become familiar with each application's powerful capabilities.

## **NOISE FIGURE**

## **4-2** NOISE FIGURE

Option 4X: 50 MHz to 3 GHz 50 MHz to 6 GHz This section contains information on three typical noise figure measurements, all performed on the same device under test (DUT). This approach allows for direct comparisons of measurement results. The procedures are presented so that each measurement builds on the setup of the previous measurement. The four sections are:

- □ External Scalar Noise Figure
- □ Internal Scalar Noise Figure
- □ Vector Error-Corrected Noise Figure
- **□** External Attenuators and Networks

The External Scalar Noise Figure measurement produces noise figure values that can be used for comparisons to other approaches.

The Internal Scalar Noise Figure measurement is similar to the External Scalar Noise Figure measurement, but the noise source is connected to the rear panel of the MS462XX. These noise figure values will generally correspond to the External Scalar measurement; however, matching difference in the path between the noise source and the DUT can cause substantial differences.

The Vector Error-Corrected Noise Figure measurement combines the S-parameter and Noise Figure measurements to compensate for mismatching effects in the measurement.

The Internal measurement capability of the MS462XX allows switching between noise figure and other measurement applications, allowing more measurements to be made with fewer connections.

The External Attenuators and Networks section overviews the correction mechanisms to minimize error when using adapters, cables, or other networks between the noise source and the DUT.






Figure 4-2. Internal Scalar Noise Figure Example Display

Vector Error-Corrected Noise Figure The following display shows a typical Vector Error-Corrected Noise Figure measurement for the same frequency range and data points as the previous measurements. The Vector Error-Corrected Noise Figure measurement combines the S-parameter and Noise Figure measurements to compensate for mismatching effects in the measurement.

The Vector Error-Corrected Noise Figure measurement requires a two-port calibration that dictates the frequency range and data points for this approach. Careful selection of system settings will help optimize both S-parameter and Noise Figure for both speed and accuracy.

External Attenuators and Networks Whenever an adapter, cable, or network is placed between the noise source and the DUT, a possible error in the resulting noise figure measurement can be introduced. While the possible error is small, when the utmost accuracy is desired, the following correction mechanisms can be implemented to minimize error.




Figure 4-6. Loss Before DUT Schematic

#### NOTES

The internal ENR extension table is created at the factory by Anritsu and is installed on both the internal memory and the hard drive. Refer to Section 7-9 for information about creating a new ENR extension file and copying the file to the internal memory and hard disk.

Loss before DUT is used to correct the ENR for any losses between the ENR reference plane and the DUT plane. If those losses are present during the calibration, then the loss should be entered before the cal is performed. If the lossy network is not present during the cal, then a value of 0 dB should be entered until after the cal is done. Only enter a value for loss before the DUT when the lossy network is present in the measurement path.

Loss Before the DUT

If a network (attenuator) is placed between Port 1 and the input of the DUT, the contribution to ENR reduction can be entered in the noise figure setup menu. This method should only be used for networks which have flat frequency response (loss is constant over frequency). Figure 4-6 shows the network attenuator represented in general as A. Use the following procedure to insert the loss before the DUT.

10. Select the noise figure setup menu:

#### Appl/NOISE FIGURE SETUP

11. Select the ENR Table Operation menu and select the ENR Table for the noise diode being used.

#### ENR TABLE OPERATION/LOAD ENR TABLE FROM HARD DISK/VENDOR ENR TABLE

12. For scalar, internal and vector corrected measurements, press the Application front panel key to return to the main NF menu:

13. Select the insertion loss before DUT option:




Figure 4-7. Loss After DUT Schematic

When a device has very high gain, the receiver may saturate during the measurement. This typically is a concern when measuring a device with >20 to 25 dB of gain with a 15 dB ENR noise diode. To prevent this, place attenuators after the DUT to reduce the power to manageable levels, as represented by B in Figure 4-7.

#### NOTES

Only use this setting when adding attenuation AFTER performing the noise figure calibration. If the instrument was calibrated with the attenuation in the path, then leave this setting zeroed out, as the instrument will already be compensating for the loss.




Figure 4-8. External Extension Files Schematic

When the network ahead of the DUT does not have a flat frequency response, the two-port S-parameters of the network can be measured, and the MS462XX can compute the correction file for the path from the rear panel of the instrument all the way to the DUT input connector. This method takes the factory generated .EXT file for the path within the instrument and concatenates it with a user generated .S2P file for the network between the port 1 connector and the DUT input connector. This is represented as A in Figure 4-8.

Notes on creating an .NFX file:

The .NFX file which characterizes the network between the port 1 connector and the DUT input connector is a user generated .S2P file of the four S-parameters for the user inserted network. When creating this file, try to keep the frequency range consistent with the NF capabilities of the instrument, although the instrument will interpolate / extrapolate as necessary.

- 1. Perform a careful calibration and measure the S-parameters of your network
- 2. Use the frequency range from 50 MHz to 3 GHz with 101 points.
- 3. Create the .S2P file

- 4. Press the Print front panel key to capture the output.
- 5. Rename the filename extension from \*.S2P to \*.NFX. This can be done using Windows Explorer or any other utility.
- 6. Copy the .NFX file back to the MS462XX.

#### NOTE

This will activate the user generated .NFX file. If this is not enabled, the results will be inaccurate, as the correction file will not be applied.

#### NOTE

The extension files are also used to correct for losses between the noise source and the DUT but with a higher level of accuracy. As with the LBD, if the network causing the loss is present during the cal, that extension file must be activated for the cal. If doing internal measurements, the internal extension file is automatically activated. The user manually activates the external extension file when appropriate.

Viewing Excess Noise Ratio (ENR) Tables

Excess noise ratio tables are unique for each noise diode and must be selected to match the diode in use for the noise figure measurement. The view ENR table function may be used to verify that the correct table is loaded, and that the table is free of errors.

# **4-3** INTERMODULATION DISTORTION

Option 13

This section contains three typical intermodulation distortion (IMD) measurements, all performed on the same device under test (DUT). This approach allows for direct comparisons of measurement results. The procedures are presented so that each measurement builds on the setup of the previous measurement. The three measurements that can be done for third, fifth, seventh, and ninth order IMD are:

- □ Two-Tone IMD Products
- □ Swept Two-Tone IMD Products
- □ Swept Two-Tone Third Order Intercept (TOI)

These three measurements are typically performed using two synthesizers and a spectrum analyzer. The typical Two-Tone IMD Products measurement is a CW-type measurement in which two CW tones are combined and applied to the input of the DUT. The non-linear characteristics of the DUT generate the IMD products. The relative magnitude of the IMD products to the two tones defines the IMD distortion.

The MS462XX provides a more powerful measurement capability by sweeping the two tones while maintaining the offset between the two tones. The results displayed versus frequency provide more useful data regarding the IMD performance of the DUT.


A swept two-tone IMD Products measurement performs this CW-type measurement within a frequency range and displays the results as IMD products versus frequency.

A swept two-tone *n*-order intercept measurement performs the swept IMD Products measurement and displays the calculated intercept versus frequency.




Figure 4-11. Simple Combining Network




Figure 4-12. Two-Tone Fifth Order IMD Products Example Display




Figure 4-13. Two-Tone Seventh Order IMD Products Example Display




Figure 4-14. Two-Tone Ninth Order IMD Products Example Display




Figure 4-16. Swept Two-Tone Fifth Order IMD Products Example Display




Figure 4-17. Swept Two-Tone Seventh Order IMD Products Example Display




Figure 4-18. Swept Two-Tone Ninth Order IMD Products Example Display





Figure 4-20. Swept Two-Tone Fifth Order Intercept Example Display

The procedures are presented so that each measurement builds on the setup of the previous measurement. The four measurements are:

- □ CW Scalar Harmonic
- □ Swept Scalar Harmonic
- □ Swept Vector Harmonic
- □ Swept Vector Harmonic Phase

These measurements are typically measured with a synthesizer and a spectrum analyzer. The CW Scalar Harmonic measurement produces comparable scalar results to that of a synthesizer and a spectrum analyzer. The Swept Scalar Harmonic provides a more comprehensive scalar harmonic performance versus frequency capability.

The Swept Vector Harmonic and the Swept Vector Harmonic Phase measurements provide a potentially more accurate, more integrated, and more flexible approach to measuring the DUT's harmonics using the MS462XX.

Vector Harmonic measurements remove the effects of the source harmonics in relatively linear measurements. In this way, Vector Harmonic measurements reveal more accurate harmonic measurements than the Scalar Harmonic measurements. This Vector Harmonic measurement capability is only available for the  $2^{nd}$  and  $3^{rd}$  harmonics.




Figure 4-24. CW Scalar Harmonic Example Display




Figure 4-25. Swept Scalar Harmonic Example Display




Figure 4-26. Vector Harmonic Measurement Display Options




Figure 4-28. Swept Vector Harmonic (=2) Phase Example Display






Figure 4-30. Swept Power Gain Compression Example Display




Figure 4-31. Typical Multiple Frequency Gain Compression Measurement








Figure 4-33. Time Domain Measurement Example Display

This measurement organization allows for straightforward and intuitive measurement operation and a convenient method for switching between different measurement applications.

More straightforward mixer measurements are possible because the MS462XX includes a selection for device type. This selection is available after the Appl/CHANGE APPLICATION SETUP keystrokes. For a selection of Device Type = Mixer, the MS462XX simplifies the setup for the selected measurement by:

- □ allowing the quick selection of which source is to be the DUT LO,
- □ allowing simple selection of a fixed LO or fixed IF measurement scenario (and specifying that LO or IF frequency), and
- □ informing the receiver of what kind of DUT conversion to expect (up conversion | RF+LO |, down conversion | RF-LO |, or no conversion as might be used for a quick leakage measurement).

Activating the Mixer device type also performs the important function of turning on both internal sources for front panel access (usually using ports 1 and 3 driving, port 2 being the receive port). Two ports are not allowed to drive simultaneously during normal S-parameter measurements.

This section contains discussions, examples, and procedures related to the following applications:

- □ Mixer Conversion Loss
- □ Mixer Noise Figure
- □ Mixer IMD
- **□** Frequency Translated Group Delay (FTGD)

Each application discussion shows a typical measurement result. The procedures document the steps used to achieve this typical measurement result.

Once a typical measurement is mastered, explore the different measurement configurations for each application to become each application's powerful capabilities.

Mixer Conversion<br/>LossThis section contains two typical mixer conversion loss measurements. These<br/>measurements are performed on the same DUT so that comparisons are pos-<br/>sible. Each subsequent measurement builds on the setup of the previous<br/>measurement.

- □ Mixer Conversion Loss, Fixed LO
- □ Mixer Conversion Loss, Fixed IF

More straightforward mixer measurements are possible because the MS462XX includes a selection for device type. For a selection of Device Type = Mixer, the MS462XX simplifies the setup for the selected measurement by:

- □ allowing simple selection of a fixed LO or fixed IF measurement scenario (and specifying that LO or IF frequency), and




The measurement itself is quite straightforward, as it is just a simple T/R non-ratioed analysis. It is important to remember that since the RF and IF frequencies are unequal in up or down conversion, there is no reference signal available. As a result, the only display parameters that are normally used in a conversion loss measurement are the test channel values  $b_i/1$ .

If an external Anritsu 68XXX or 69XXX source is to be used as the LO, then the GPIB cable from the source must be connected to the dedicated GPIB port of MS462XX prior to applying power to the MS462XX. Refer to Figure 4- for a sample connection diagram.

### Instrument Setup for External Synthesizer Supplied LO

Once both instruments are powered on, use the following procedure to verify that the GPIB address for the synthesizer is set correctly.




Figure 4-35. Mixer Conversion Loss, Fixed LO Example Display




Figure 4-36. Mixer Conversion Loss, Fixed LO




Figure 4-37. Mixer Conversion Loss, Fixed IF Example Display

The following three assumptions are made regarding mixer noise figure measurements using the MS462XX:

- □ The IF of the mixer DUT will be connected to Port 2 of the MS462XX and the IF will have a frequency range within the present system limits of 50 and 3000 MHz.
- □ The LO of the mixer DUT should be supplied by the optional Source 2. Source 1 cannot be used during mixer noise figure measurements.
- The frequency conversion in the mixer DUT cannot link to a 12-term calibration so mixer noise figure measurements are limited to the scalar approach.

The following measurements are performed externally; however, internal routing is permitted. In addition, wideband noise figure measurements are performed, but narrowband is also permitted.

The device to be tested has a fixed LO (at +7 dBm) of 700 MHz and a RF range of 920 to 1000 MHz. The noise figure in the IF range of 220 to 300 MHz will be measured. There is a low pass filter following the mixer DUT with a cutoff frequency of 550 MHz. The noise source provides the RF and Internal Source 2 provides the LO for the mixer DUT.




Figure 4-39. Mixer Noise Figure, Fixed LO






Figure 4-41. Mixer Noise Figure, Fixed IF Example Display





#### NOTE

If not invoked, the calculated insertion gain will be a sum of the two sideband responses and may be higher than is practically useful. The SSB correction simply subtracts 3 dB from the calculated insertion gain before it is used in calculations. This assumes that the DUT conversion gain/loss is the same for the two sidebands and may be simplistic.

There are two ways the LO can degrade a mixer NF measurement:

- □ Direct LO leakage: Since mixer isolation is often less than 30 dB and a discrete signal of -90 dBm can affect a noise figure measurement, filtering of the LO on the output path is critical. If the LO is close to the output signal band, the filtering may need to be quite steep.
- □ LO noise conversion: If the LO is noisy or has spurs at an offset equal to the DUT output frequency, this noise/spur content can convert to the output frequency and impact the measurement. While spurs may be difficult to counteract, broadband noise effects can be reduced through power budgeting. In many sources, the broadband noise originates in the output amplifiers and the level control precedes these amplifiers. If the source is set for maximum power and the output padded externally, the absolute (and relative) level of the broadband noise can be reduced while keeping the LO drive at the correct level.

This completes the procedure for performing the Mixer Noise Figure, Fixed IF measurement using the MS462XX.

#### *Mixer Intermodulation Distortion (IMD)*

Option 13

This section contains four typical mixer IMD measurements. These measurements are performed on the same DUT so that comparisons are possible. Each subsequent measurement builds on the setup of the previous measurement.

- □ CW Mixer IMD
- □ Swept Mixer IMD, Fixed LO
- □ Swept Mixer IMD, Fixed IF
- □ Swept Mixer Third Order Intercept (TOI), Fixed IF

More straightforward mixer measurements are possible because the MS462XX includes a selection for device type. This selection is available after the Appl/CHANGE APPLICATION SETUP keystrokes. For a selection of Device Type = Mixer, the MS462XX simplifies the setup for the selected measurement by:

- □ allowing the quick selection of which source is to be the DUT LO,
- □ allowing simple selection of a fixed LO or fixed IF measurement scenario (and specifying that LO or IF frequency), and
- □ informing the receiver of what kind of DUT conversion to expect (up conversion | RF+LO |, down conversion | RF-LO |, or no conversion as might be used for a quick leakage measurement).

Activating the Mixer device type also performs the important function of turning on both internal sources for front panel access (usually using ports 1 and 3 driving, port 2 being the receive port). Two ports are not allowed to drive simultaneously during normal S-parameter measurements.

#### **Setup Considerations**

Time Base Synchronization

This measurement requires an external synthesizer with the time bases of the instruments synchronized. The 10 MHz reference out from the synthesizer must be connected to the 10 MHz reference in on the MS462XX to synchronize the time bases. In addition, the MS462XX requires a manual selection to engage the external source (see Utility/REAR PANEL/REFERENCE FREQUENCY).

If this is not done, the tones and intermodulation products may not be exactly where the receiver expects them (particularly at smaller IF bandwidths) and poor results will be obtained. If the external 10 MHz is not connected but the reference selection is still external, the MS462XX may not sweep or an error message "PHASE LOCK FAIL DFCEBAKJ" (or similar random letters) may be displayed. **GPIB** Considerations

Ideally, the synthesizer will be connected to the dedicated GPIB port and turned on prior to turning on the MS462XX and the synthesizer will not be turned off while the MS462XX is running. If it is necessary to activate the synthesizer after turning on the MS462XX, the following procedure may be used

- 1. Enter the multiple source menu (but go no further down that tree) AFTER the synthesizer has booted (this allows the system to recognize the existence of the synthesizer). Assuming the synthesizer is set to address 9 (default address for source 3), check under Config/Sources/Source3 to see that the source is ACTIVE. If the addresses are out of synch, review the setups and repeat.
- 2. Verify that the sources have been selected under the IMD application menu/SOURCE SELECTION. The default is sources 1 and 2 will be tones 1 and 2 while source 3 will be the LO. Ensure that the mode is APPLY.
- 3. Activate Mixer mode, usually the synthesizer will enter remote mode and will be programmed appropriately
- 4. If not done already, connect the 10 MHz lines as discussed above and switch the MS462XX to external reference.


If the synthesizer must be turned off or disconnected prior to shutting down the MS462XX (or the user will be later rebooting the MS462XX without a synthesizer connected), the following steps will help

- 1. Switch the MS462XX to INTERNAL reference and disconnect the 10 MHz line
- 2. Under Config/Sources, set the external source to INACTIVE
- 3. The external synthesizer can now be disconnected or turned off. Note that if a setup is to be saved, whether the external synthesizer is connected (and recognized) is critical. The setup can only be recalled with the same physical connections present.

These setup considerations can help with setup issues and general measurement flow.

**CW Mixer IMD** The device to be tested has a fixed LO (of +7 dBm) at 3 GHz. The first tone is at 3500 MHz and the second tone is offset 1.01 MHz from the first tone (or at 3501.01 MHz). Both tones are applied to the combining network at 0 dBm. Only output-referred intermodulation products are of interest so no calibrations will be performed. Sources 1 and 2 of the MS462XX will be tones 1 and 2 while the external source (Source 3) will provide the LO to the mixer DUT.

The MS462XX has already been turned on with the synthesizer connected and is in Device Type = Standard mode.

Figure 4-43. Mixer IMD, CW Example Display




Figure 4-44. CW Mixer IMD




Figure 4-46. Swept Mixer IMD, Fixed IF Example Display



Frequency Translated Group Delay (FTGD)

Option 5

Group delay is a common figure of merit used in determining how much distortion a given device will add to a communications system. Traditionally, this measurement was obtained from the change in phase over the change in frequency during a transmission measurement. While this method works well for non-frequency translating devices, it fails miserably with frequency translating devices as accurate and stable phase information is generally available.

### FTGD, Fixed LO

In this example, the DUT is a mixer and a low pass filter functioning as a down converter. The RF frequency range for this test is 1900 MHz to 2150 MHz, the LO frequency is fixed at 1100 MHz resulting in an IF frequency range of 800 MHz to 1050 MHz. The RF power is -5 dBm while the LO power is +7 dBm. The corresponding conversion loss is roughly 6 dB.




Figure 4-48. Mixer and LPF for FTGD Measurement




Figure 4-49. Frequency Translated Group Delay Measurement (Down conversion)

For a standard (non-mixer) T/R measurement, any of the usual calibration techniques may be applied (one-port, 12-term, etc.). If the power sweep is covering ranges close to +10 dBm, it may be desirable to perform the cal while in power sweep mode to remove some receiver compression effects (specified to be < 0.1-0.2 dB at +10 dBm port depending on model). In other situations, the calibration will be effectively power-independent assuming the step attenuator is not changed. Most of the measurements in this category will be akin to AM-AM or AM-PM conversion analysis and are useful for studying compression effects on linear parameters.




Figure 4-50. AM/PM Measurement of an Amplifier




Figure 4-51. S21 and S11 for an Amplifier




Figure 4-53. Mixer Conversion Loss Compression with the LO Sweeping




Figure 4-54. Mixer Isolation as a Function of LO Drive

This example shows the application of the harmonic enhancement cal within power sweep. #### Example 8: Swept Power IMD and Mixer IMD Measurements Option 8

## NOTE

Make sure SWEEP MODE is set to SOURCE, not CW RCVR.

#### NOTE

Avoid specifying offsets that are multiples of 125 kHz. These frequencies may create an image problem if the IMD products to be observed are very small. Verify IMD products before measurements by connecting a thru between the combining network and Port 2. Changing the offset frequency by as little as 1 kHz can improve the IMD performance. All IMD products and intercepts can be computed during a power sweep and can provide a powerful tool for distortion analysis. Receiver cal and IMD cal are available for use in input-referred measurements. The IMD cal should be performed while in power sweep. It is often useful to examine IMD products versus power, since they rarely follow the simplistic linear power dependence due to the presence of multiple non-linearities of a given order and the interaction of different order non-linearities.

The first example in this section is of the third through ninth intermodulation products (odd orders only) of an amplifier. A receiver cal was used for this measurement. Above about -5 dBm input power, this amplifier is extremely non-linear as is evidenced by the magnitude of the intermodulation products. The shapes of the higher order product curves during power sweep are of particular interest in optimizing amplifier performance.

This example assumes the previous examples have been done and the MS462XX is in Power Sweep mode.




Figure 4-57. Third Through Ninth (odd) Order Intermodulation Products of an Amplifier

Example 9: Input Referenced IP3 Option 13

#### NOTE

Avoid specifying offsets that are multiples of 125 kHz. These frequencies may create an image problem if the IMD products to be observed are very small. Verify IMD products before measurements by connecting a thru between the combining network and Port 2. Changing the offset frequency by as little as 1 kHz can improve the IMD performance. As is obvious, the curves in the previous example are not simple straight lines as expected from a naive analysis. This impacts the interpretation of an intercept calculation, which is a simple single point extrapolation, as shown in Figure 4-58. The displayed intercept is calculated from the intermodulation product (and main tone power) at that given power point using a linear model. For this reason, the intermodulation product curves of Figure 4-57 are often preferred for analysis.

Figure 4-58 shows an input-referred third order intercept point plot where the IMD calibration was done while in power sweep. If the amplifier was non-linear, this power sweep would be flat. As the power level increases, the extrapolation used in computing the intercept becomes increasingly power dependent.

NOTE

Avoid specifying offsets that are multiples of 125 kHz. These frequencies may create an image problem if the IMD products to be observed are very small. Verify IMD products before measurements by connecting a thru between the combining network and Port 2. Changing the offset frequency by as little as 1 kHz can improve the IMD performance. In both of the previous examples, tone 1 and tone 2 swept over the exact same power ranges. Sometimes, a more general sweep is desired (may be required by a given standard) and almost any linear relationship is possible (as long as both sources remain in their respective ALC control ranges). Figure 4-59 contains a plot of the third order IMD product when source 2 sweeps at a fixed offset of -5 dB relative to source 1. It is possible for the sources to sweep over entirely different ranges, with different step sizes, as long as the number of power points are the same. Both IMD products are shown in Figure 4-59 since they will not be the same in this case. The upper curve is the upper sideband (relative to tone 1) while the lower curve is the lower sideband relative to tone 2. The effect of the asymmetry is quite clear in this example.

1. In IMD power sweep, configure the CW frequency to 1.12 GHz, and configure the IMD setup and display as follows:

Example 11: IMD 3 for a Passive Mixer Option 13 In mixer IMD measurements, the RF will usually be swept, and the corresponding IMD/IP products observed. Sometimes it may be interesting to sweep the LO alone (or in combination with sweeping the RF) to observe the effects of LO starvation or due to some power coupling of the practical signal sources. In all of the mixer examples to follow; a simple, passive doubly-balanced mixer was employed. Because of current control restrictions, the examples are set up so that the external synthesizer is not sweeping power.




Figure 4-60. IMD3 Product for a Passive Mixer with Fixed LO Drive (+10 dBm)

Figure 4-60 shows the case of a fixed LO (source 3, an external synthesizer) at 900 MHz and +10 dBm. The two RF tones, from sources 1 and 2, are swept (equal amplitude this time) and the IMD3 product is plotted. As might be expected from the earlier conversion loss compression measurements, the distortion increases significantly as the RF power gets within about 10 dB of the LO power for this passive mixer.

#### NOTE

Avoid specifying offsets that are multiples of 125 kHz. These frequencies may create an image problem if the IMD products to be observed are very small. Verify IMD products before measurements by connecting a thru between the combining network and Port 2. Changing the offset frequency by as little as 1 kHz can improve the IMD performance.

#### NOTE

Verify that the 10 MHz cable to the external synthesizer is connected. 1. In IMD power sweep, configure the CW frequency to 1 GHz, configure the IMD setup and display as follows:

Verify IMD products before measurements by connecting a thru between the combining network and Port 2. Changing the offset frequency by as little as 1 kHz can improve the IMD performance.

#### NOTE

Verify that the 10 MHz cable to the external synthesizer is connected.

Another option is to fix the RF tones (at 1 GHz and 1.003 GHz respectively, -10 dBm each) and sweep the LO power. Sources 1 and 3 were used for the RF tones and source 2 was used as the LO in this case although that is not a requirement. Again an IF of 100 MHz is used for this example mixer. The LO sweep range is indicated in the menu at the right and although guaranteed port power is only +10 dBm for this instrument, 15 dBm was available at this frequency (maximum power and frequencies at which they occur may vary). The distortion asymptotes to a reasonably low value as the LO drive reaches a sufficiently high level.

1. In IMD power sweep, configure the CW frequency to 16 GHz, configure the IMD setup and display as follows:




*Figure 4-61. IMD3 Product for a Passive Mixer with Fixed RF Tones (-10 dBm)*

5-2	THREE-PORT BALANCED MEASUREMENT	This section shows how to extract Mixed Mode S-parameters from a three-port balanced device, in this case a balun. A balun is a network or de- vice used for the transformation from a balanced transmission line or system to an unbalanced line or system, or vice versa.
		It is important that the single-ended port of the device under test (DUT) be connected to Port 1 of the MS462XX and the remaining ports connected to Ports 2 and 3 of the MS462XX (see Figure 5-1).
		The three-port Mixed Mode S-parameters are:

- 3. Select CH1 and press the Meas front panel key.
- 4. Select the menu soft keys as follows:

- 9. Select CH3 and press the Meas front panel key.

11. Press the Display front panel key and the following menu soft keys:





Figure 5-2. Three-Port Balanced Measurement Results

Figure 5-2 shows that S21 and S31 have nearly the same magnitude and are approximately 180 degrees out of phase, which is typical of baluns. As would be expected of a differential device, SD1 is large in magnitude and SC1 is small.

#### **5-3** FOUR-PORT BALANCED MEASUREMENT

A four-port balanced measurement setup is similar to a three-port balanced measurement with the exception of the Mixed Mode S-parameter choices.

Connect the device under test as shown in Figure 5-3.

NOTE

In four-port balanced measurements, it is important that balanced Port 1 is connected to Ports 1 and 2 of the MS462XD, and balanced Port 2 is connected to Ports 3 and 4 of the MS462XD. To perform a four-port balanced measurement of Mixed Mode S-parameters:

- 1. Perform a four-port calibration (refer to Section 3-8).
- 2. Connect the DUT as shown in Figure 5-1. Make sure that the unbalanced port of the device is connected to Port 1 of the MS462xD.
- 3. Select CH1 and press the Meas front panel key.
- 4. Select the menu soft keys as follows:

S21, TRANS b2/a1

- 5. Press the Display front panel key and the following menu soft keys: GRAPH TYPE/MORE/LINEAR MAGNITUDE AND PHASE.
- 6. Select CH2 and press the Meas front panel key.
- 7. Select the menu soft keys as follows:

MIXED MODE S-PARAMETER/MORE

## BALANCED MEASUREMENTS FOUR-PORT BALANCED MEASUREMENT

The four-port S-parameters begin with SD1D1 Differential Mode and end with SC2D2 Mode Conversion. There are 16 Mixed Mode S-parameters for a balanced four port as well as 16 unbalanced S-parameters. The 16 Mixed Mode S-parameters are:

# **5-4 BALANCED** Balanced Parameter data, designated MnP data, can be obtained in a similar manner as S-parameter data. To extract the Balanced Parameter data:

1. Press the Hard Copy front panel key and the following menu soft keys:

OUTPUT DEVICE/DISK FILE RETURN OUTPUT SETUP1 DESTINATION = FLOPPY DISK FORMAT = SnP OPTIONS (S1P, S2P, S3P, S4P, M3P, or M4P) RETURN PRINT

Like SnP data, MnP data will result in magnitude and angle information for three-port balanced devices (M3P data) and four-port balanced devices (M4P).

#### 5-5 IMPEDANCE TRANSFORMATION

The Impedance Transformation function addresses the reality that balanced devices may not have 50 Ohm impedances on each single-ended leg. A balanced impedance is considered to be divided equally between the ports. For example, a device with a balance impedance of 150 Ohms on balanced port 1 has 75 Ohms impedance on each leg of the balanced port. To apply Impedance Transformation to a three-port device with one balanced port of 150 Ohms:

1. Press the Config front panel key and the following menu soft keys:

IMPEDANCE TRANSFORMATION/ PORT = 1 RESISTIVE TERM = 50 Ohms REACTIVE TERM (j) = 0 Ohms IMPEDANCE TRANSFORMATION/ PORT = 2 RESISTIVE TERM = 75 Ohms REACTIVE TERM (j) = 0 Ohms IMPEDANCE TRANSFORMATION/ PORT = 3 RESISTIVE TERM = 75 Ohms REACTIVE TERM = 75 Ohms COMPUTATION METHOD = PSEUDO-WAVE

2. To apply the define Impedance Transformation press the menu soft key: IMPEDANCE TRANSFORMATION = ON

#### NOTE

Pseudo-wave and power wave are different S-parameter representations, each used in some simulators, that can affect the Impedance Transformation if the reference impedances Z<sub>i</sub> are not real. The pseudo-wave representation is physical. The power wave representation is not physical, but is a visualization tool to help analyze power flows in some circuits. When Z is not real, the transformations can differ radically. For more detailed information on pseudo-wave and power wave, refer to the Anritsu Arbitrary Impedance Application Note, part number 11410-00284.



# **5-6** EMBEDDING AND DE-EMBEDDING

#### NOTE

Within the E/DE feature, press HELP = ON to view detailed instructions and information.

#### NOTE

E/DE networks are stored in dynamic memory and are not maintained if the VNMS is turned off. Select SAVE on the E/DE Function menu to save networks on a floppy disk. Because it is important to know the S-parameter data of the DUT, and the effects of adding or removing test fixtures or transmission lines to the DUT, the MS462XX has an Embedding and De-embedding (e/de) feature. This feature makes it possible to move the calibrated VNAs error reference plane(s) to a different position by mathematically adding (embedding) or removing (de-embedding) certain structures from the measured data. Multiple networks can be cascaded on any unbalanced or balanced port so it is crucial that order of entry be kept in mind. Networks are entered starting at the DUT planes and working out toward the MS462XX. Two-port networks are grouped together, as are four-port networks, and the two-port networks are placed closest to the DUT.

The following example illustrates how embedding and de-embedding is applied to a three-port balanced device. T-line segments are de-embedded from each port, then a circuit network is embedded onto the balanced port.

- 1. Perform an OSLT three-port calibration (refer to Section 3-6).
- 2. Set the screen to display the S-parameters that would be affected by embedding or de-embedding.
- 3. Press the Config front panel key and the following menu soft keys to set T-Line parameters for Port 1 of the DUT:

NTWK EMBEDDING/DE-EMBEDDING SELECT DUT TYPE = 3 PORT SELECT PORT P1

On the MS462XX display, ADD ON TO NTWKS should be highlighted in red since P1 has no existing network present.

4. To set T-Line parameters for Port 2 of the DUT, press the following menu soft keys:

5. To set T-Line parameters for Port 3 of the DUT, press the following menu soft keys:

Again, ADD ON TO NTWKS should be highlighted in red, as P3 has no existing network present.

DE-EMBEDDING SELECT NTWK GENERATION METHOD/CIRCUIT TOPOLOGY = T-LINE SECTION/ TIME =92 PS APPLY RETURN RETURN RETURN

6. To apply the T-Line sections to the measured data, press the menu soft key:

EMBEDDING/DE-EMBEDDING = ON.

The system will take a moment to calculate and apply the Embedding/De-embedding correction to the measured data, and an indicator will be present on the screen.

To embed a circuit network onto the DUT follow the procedure below.

7. Press the following menu soft keys:

EMBEDDING/DE-EMBEDDING = OFF SELECT DUT TYPE = 3 PORT SELECT PORT P2-P3

To check the embedding or de-embedding networks applied at each port, SELECT PORT = P1 and press EM-BEDDING/DE-EM-BEDDING LOG.





Figure 5-5. Em/De is turned off and no matching or impedance transformations are applied.

Repeat until all the screens needed for quick access are defined as a group. For convenience, GROUP 1 through 4 are predefined into three categories called:

- □ SINGLE ENDED S-PARAMETERS
- BALANCED DIFFERENTIAL
- □ SINGLE ENDED BALANCED DIFFERENTIAL.

To select these categories:

2. Press the Display front panel key and the following menu soft keys:





2. Press the Display front panel key and the following menu soft keys:

Once applied to the active channel, in this case CH 3, the results of the math with INTERCHAN MATH APPLIED will be shown on the active channel.

Many of the feature discussions present a typical measurement result, and the procedures document the steps used to achieve this typical measurement result.

**6-2** HARD COPY AND DISK OUTPUT Standard Feature In addition to the front panel LCD display, the MS462XX is capable of outputting measurement data to printers, plotters, and disk files in a variety of convenient formats. Flexibility to choose between the desired output formats is provided by choosing the Hard Copy front panel key. Once the output format is chosen, the front panel Print key can be selected to format the data according to the Hard Copy selections.

### HARD COPY AND DISK OUTPUT

	Selecting the Hard Copy key from the front panel of the MS462XX will offer the following selections:
	Output Device: select between printer, plotter or disk file
	Output Setup: depending upon the device selection, a variety of options will be offered to further customize the output

	<ul> <li>Output Options: provides capability to route tabular data from the hard disk or floppy disk to the output device</li> </ul>

Output Device: Printer	A connection between the printer and the MS462XX standard 25-pin parallel port printer is required. A variety of Thinkjet <sup>®</sup> , Deskjet <sup>®</sup> and Epson printers are supported. When using the printer, options are provided to print both graphical and tabular data via the Output Setup menu selections.
Output Device: Plotter	A GPIB connection between a plotter and the MS462XX Dedicated GPIB is required. The protocol used to control plotters is HP-GL (Hewlett-Packard Graphics Language), which is capable of drawing only the data trace(s) so that multiple traces may be drawn on a single sheet of paper. When using the plotter, options are provided to format plots in full or quarter sizes.
Output Device: Disk File	When using the disk file as the output device, additional options are provided for specifying both the destination and the format. The options for destination choices include both hard disk and floppy disk, and the format choices include text, SnP, tabular data, bitmap, and HPGL.
	A popular format for interacting with simulators is the SnP format, so there are additional options for this format to further customize this output for a variety of preferences:

	This completes the procedure for outputting measurements to printers, plot- ters and disk files using the MS462xx.

#### **6-3** THREE-PORT DIPLEXER MEASUREMENTS

Calibration using the three-port calibration technique is available as Option 3A for 3 GHz Source (B Models only), Option 3B for 6 GHz Source (B Models only), and Option 6 (when using an external synthesizer).





Figure 6-1. Typical Three-Port Measurement of a Diplexer Example Display

This completes the procedure for performing a three-port measurement of a diplexer with the MS462XX.

#### NOTE

If measurement speed is the ultimate goal, increase the I.F. Bandwidth (Avg/SELECT I.F. BANDWIDTH), decrease the Data Points (Config/DATA POINTS) and use Tune Mode (Sweep/TUNE MODE). Select Sweep to show the actual sweep time performance for the measurement.

### **6-4** TUNE MODE

Standard Feature

Tune Mode can dramatically increase the speed of a measurement by updating forward S-parameters more frequently than reverse ones. A Tune Mode Count dictates the forward measurement count before the reverse measurement is performed, allowing for real-time tuning of a DUT. For the purpose of demonstration, the Tune Mode feature is presented for a diplexer, but this feature is also applicable for two-port measurements.

The following display shows a typical three-port measurement of a diplexer.




Figure 6-3. Typical Three-Port Measurement of a Diplexer Example Display

1. Perform a three-port calibration for the desired frequency range (refer to Section 3-6).

2. Connect the three ports of the diplexer to the three ports of the MS462XX, then press the following keys:

**TEST SEQUENCE** 

A sequence of keystrokes can be stored in memory or on disk for later playback, thus saving time on repetitive front panel operations. This feature is demonstrated by documenting a peak-to-peak ripple filter measurement. The following display shows the results of a peak-to-peak ripple filter measurement using a test sequence.

The setup for this measurement requires markers 1 and 2 to represent the bandwidth where the peak-to-peak measurement is performed. Markers 11 and 12 are used to find the maximum and minimum values between markers 1 and 2. In addition, a manual measurement should be performed such that the above display is observable.

The following procedure documents the steps for creating a test sequence for the peak-to-peak measurement.

- Seq/UTILITY/RENAME SEQUENCE allows names to be assigned to sequence numbers.
- While editing a sequence, Seq/EDITING FUNCTIONS/CLEAR EDITING WINDOW clears the editing window so that a command effect can be viewed. Seq/EDITING FUNCTIONS/RESTORE EDITING WINDOW restores the editing window so that more editing can be performed.
- While editing a sequence, Seq/EDITING FUNCTIONS/CANCEL SEQUENCE EDIT aborts the editing sequence. Remove the editing window by selecting Seq/DONE SEQUENCE EDIT.

### **6-6** EXTERNAL SCSI

Standard Feature

The MS462XX contains approximately 2 MB of non-volatile memory that acts as a virtual internal hard drive. An external SCSI-2 interface on the MS462XX rear panel allows an external hard drive to be used in place of the internal non-volatile memory. When an external hard drive is used, the MS462XX storage capacity is limited only by the size of the SCSI-2 hard drive, rather than the non-volatile memory.

Figure 6-6 shows a typical directory of the MS462XX non-volatile memory.




Figure 6-7 shows two typical hard disk directories of the MS462XX when an external SCSI-2 hard drive is attached to the external SCSI-2 interface.

The 40 files shown in the hard disk directory use 2.68 MB of memory space, which is more than the approximately 2 MB of non-volatile memory supplied.

The following procedure describes how to use the external SCSI-2 interface when attaching a hard drive. The procedure begins by backing up the files in the internal non-volatile memory to a floppy disk. The SCSI-2 hard drive is then installed and the original files are transferred from the floppy to the SCSI-2 hard drive.

1. Press the front panel keys and menu soft keys as follows:

2. Insert a blank formatted High Density (1.44 MB) diskette into the MS462XX floppy drive.

- 4. When complete, select DONE and the MS462XX will copy the contents of the hard drive to the floppy.
- 5. Press Clr on the front panel to quit the command line.
- 6. Turn the MS462XX OFF using the Power switch on the front panel.
- 7. Attach the SCSI-2 hard drive to the external SCSI-2 interface on the MS462XX rear panel.
- 8. Turn the MS462XX ON using the Power switch on the front panel.
- 9. Press the front panel keys and menu soft keys as follows:






Each marker becomes the active marker upon selection. An active marker is indicated on the display as a marker number inside a square. MARKER MODE = DISCRETE limits the marker locations to only the calibration frequency points. MARKER MODE = CONTINUOUS allows marker locations other than calibration frequency points by performing interpolation between two calibration points.




Single channel display with four markers shown on the active channel.



Single channel display with four markers shown on the active channel using differences between markers mode ( $\Delta$ REF MODE).




Single channel display with four markers shown on the active channel using differences between markers mode ( $\Delta$ REF MODE). Here, the marker screen display is ON.




Dual channel display with three markers shown on the active channel . The marker screen display is ON.









Four channel display where each channel has three marker values shown. Marker screen display is ON.






Figure 6-17. Seven Segmented Limit Lines Example Display

# **6-9** ALTERNATE SWEEP

The MS462XX provides the capability to decouple channels 1 and 2 from channels 3 and 4. In this way, channels 1 and 2 can have different system settings and calibrations than channels 3 and 4.

Standard Feature

The following display shows the alternate sweep feature applied to the measurement of a bandpass filter.




Figure 6-18. Alternate Sweep Example Display

Although not clear in the above display, the bottom two channels (the alternate sweep) are shown in a different color than the primary sweep (the top two channels). The default color for data traces while using the alternate sweep is yellow, whereas, the default color for data traces while using the primary sweep is red.

Note that the frequency range for the top two channels (channels 1 and 2) is 1750 to 2080 MHz while the frequency range for the bottom two channels (channels 3 and 4) is 1000 to 3000 MHz. The following display illustrates this difference with an overlay display.




Figure 6-19. Alternate Sweep Overlay Example Display

In this display, the same bandpass filter response is shown, but the responses are shown on two difference frequency ranges (see the frequency range portion of display). When using alternate sweep, the system allows separate settings from the primary sweep. These different settings include Calibration, Frequency, I.F. Bandwidth, Data Points, Source Power, Markers, Limits, and Averaging.

1. Press the Appl front panel key and select the menu soft keys as follows:

The primary sweep is active for system setting changes when Ch 1 or Ch 2 is selected.

The alternate sweep is active for system setting changes when Ch 3 or Ch 4 is selected.

Another interesting feature involves switching between the primary and alternate sweep.

Ch 1 (or Ch 2)

2. Press the Sweep front panel key and select the menu soft keys as follows:

Note that the four-channel display reverts to the primary sweep system settings. The following procedure allows a four channel display of the alternate sweep.




Figure 6-20. Results of a Full Sweep Example Display




Figure 6-21. Results of a Marker Sweep Example Display




Figure 6-22. Filter Measurement with Frequency Blanking Activated

These building blocks provide a suite of unique, innovative and practical measurements for characterizing amplifiers and other active devices in both R&D and manufacturing using a Scorpion Vector Network Measurement System.




Figure 7-1. Scorpion Navigator Interface




Figure 7-3. Four-Port AutoCal System Setup

- SCE Features A searchable command database can be accessed through the user-friendly computer interface. The database provides command mnemonic names, descriptions and usage information, and is searchable by mnemonic, description, query command, application and user comment.
  - A programming manual link allows access to the Scorpion Programming Manual in Adobe Acrobat reader format.
  - □ The programming interface allows selection of GPIB or Ethernet interfaces.
  - □ The programming interface generates the code required to duplicate the command sequences exercised through the SCE interface. This feature currently supports the Visual Basic programming language.

**Operation** The MS462XX command database can be accessed through the SCE graphical user interface (GUI). The command database is fully searchable and fully integrated into the SCE. For example, clicking on a command listed in the command list window will automatically open the Scorpion Interface screen and place the selected command in the execution box ready for execution over the selected remote interface.

Scorpion Interface screen features include:

- **Given Solution** Switch between interface types (GPIB or Ethernet).
- The "Auto Command Spell Check" option (located in the Options menu screen) verifies that a command is valid. It also verifies that the command Read or Write execution method is correctly selected. This option is selectable allowing advanced users the flexibility of turning this option off and executing commands freely over the GPIB/ Ethernet Interface.
- □ Automatic Code Generation can execute commands over the selected interface. The automatically generated code can then be copied into the ATE program to help speed up development.
- □ The Feature button allows selection of available features. Currently available features are:

The Get Trace feature performs a screen capture (supported in both GPIB and Ethernet interfaces). When a screen capture is executed the code required to duplicate it is generated automatically in the Code Generation window, to easily reproduce the result in another program.

The Get Sequence feature provides the ability to manipulate sequences remotely. As with the Get Trace feature, this feature also creates the code in the code window for use in other programs.

An important feature of the SCE Scorpion Interface is the ability to automatically generate the code required to duplicate the mnemonic commands sent. The SCE can send command mnemonics out over the GPIB or the Ethernet and then automatically generates the Visual Basic code required to duplicate the command sequence in the Visual Basic programming language.

The SCE Scorpion Interface also provides the ability to record and play back a sequence of commands. With scripting turned ON, all commands are recorded. The script can be run from the SCE environment and then cut and pasted into an ATE program. This provides the means to rapidly develop ATE applications by making it easy to experiment and learn programming requirements for each command. 7-6 DRIVERS AND POWER TOOLS Freeware

Power Tools (Anritsu part number: 2300-218) is an instrument driver that replaces GPIB command mnemonics with meaningful function names. Since Power Tools is packaged as Dynamic Link Libraries (DLLs), it supports most Windows-based software development tools. In this way, Power Tools provides an intuitive and straightforward approach to controlling the MS462XX from Automatic Test Equipment (ATE) Application Programs.

The following block diagrams show the relationship between the MS462XX and the ATE Application Program.




Figure 7-6. MS462XX and ATE Application Program Block Diagrams

The block diagram on the left shows a typical ATE System. In this case, the Instrument Driver Software is an integral part of the ATE Application Program.

The block diagram on the right shows a Power Tools Enabled ATE System. In this case, the Instrument Driver Software (or VNA Power Tools) is not an integral part of the ATE Application Program. This system configuration affords many advantages over the typical ATE System. Three of these advantages with explanations are shown in the following table.

In addition, the VNA Display Capture allows both color or black and white captures.

When completed, make sure to save the file as text. Since most programs automatically append extensions to the filename, make sure to change the extension to \*.ext. Copy this file to a high density (1.44 MB) floppy for transfer to the MS462XX hard disk.

This file is generated at the factory by performing a measurement of the through path between the back panel and the Port 1 connector. The procedure involves a 101 point calibration between 50 MHz and 3 GHz. The four channel display is configured for real and imaginary output for  $S_{11}$ ,  $S_{21}$ ,  $S_{12}$ , and  $S_{22}$ . This data is output to disk using TEXT format.

Using this same technique, the noise source (no bias applied) measurement is also performed to obtain the real and imaginary performance between 50 MHz and 3 GHz. These two files are combined (typically using Excel) for the final file.

The following procedure loads this file onto the hard disk of the MS462XX.

- 1. Insert the floppy into the floppy drive of the MS462XX.
- 2. Press the front panel keys and menu soft keys as follows:
